With very little time remaining, the Council took up a proposal to end assistance by the University to draft boards. The motion by David F. Aberle, professor of anthropology, is on the agenda for today's faculty meeting.

Because Aberle was expected to soften some provisions—mainly a ban on reporting whether an individual is enrolled or not and his class standing—before presenting it today, the Council voted not to act on the motion. A postponement was asked so it could find out student opinion on the connection between the draft and the registrar's office. Drummonds said he thought that most students probably want the registrar to report.

After two hours of discussion, the Council decided it would need time to deal with some business it didn't finish and some more it didn't even get to Tuesday. It will go to twice-monthly meetings on the first and third Tuesdays each month. There may be some emergency sessions besides.

Oregon Education Loans Distributed

PORTLAND (AP)—Educators and banking officials from throughout Oregon are meeting to distribute education loans.

Frank Jonasson, chairman of Oregon's student financial aid advisory committee, said students who come from families with incomes less than \$15,000 annually can obtain up to \$1,000 per school year and can start applying Tuesday.

He said each student must negotiate his or her loan through a bank, savings and loan association, credit union or insurance company.

Students must show that they are enrolled in college to obtain the loan.

Jonasson said Oregon residents who attend college in other states will be eligible.

The following amounts have been allocated:

- Colleges and universities in Oregon System of Higher Education—\$436,130.
- Oregon community colleges—\$106,890.
- Privately - operated four-year colleges—\$95,950.
- Oregon students attending out-of-state schools — \$25,220.

Students to Rate Class at Texas

AUSTIN, Tex. (CPS)—If you have complaints about your education, take them to class.

That is what a group of University of Texas students will be doing this term when they enroll in a newly instituted course on the educational process.

The course, a non-credit seminar led by assistant professor of psychology Thomas Friedman, will allow students to examine systematically the education they are receiving. The course will have no set content and students can initiate discussion on any aspect of education—from the value of grades to teacher training.

"We have no sacred cow," Friedman said. "As I see the seminar, it will be an opportunity for some of us to back off and take a look at what we are going through, what the problems are, and what some of the long term trends and solutions may be."

The interdisciplinary course will have no exams or grades, but students will complete a research project.

Med School Sets Admissions Tests

All premedical students who intend to apply for admission to the class entering medical schools in September, 1967, must take the Medical College Admission Test on October 22 if they have not already done so. Applications must be filed in New York by Friday. Application forms are available in the biology office, 361 Science.

Students who wish to have recommendation to medical schools, from the Premedical Advisory Committee of the University, should inform the chairman of the committee, B. T. Scheer, department of biology, in writing, giving name, student body number, local address, the names of faculty members or others who are personally acquainted with the student, and the names of the medical schools to which they intend to apply.

Panhellenic Discusses Closing Hour Ruling

The dry pledge rules and extended closing hours were the two main topics at the Panhellenic meeting Tuesday night.

An extension of closing hours from 11 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. on Sunday through Thursday nights was recommended by Panhellenic. Future action will be taken by the individual houses on whether they want extended closing hours or not. If they do, the issue will go before the Student Conduct Committee.

The idea of senior keys was also discussed for seniors and women over 21. The prospect of 2 a.m. closing hours for sophomores and juniors will be delayed until after

the possibility of senior keys has been investigated.

The possibility of terminating the dry pledge rule for freshman pledges was also discussed. Several representatives felt that since Oregon law already prohibits the selling of alcoholic beverages to anyone under 21 there is no real need for the dry law pledge rule. However, before any action can be taken by the individual houses on the matter, the Presidents' Council will have to make a recommendation.

Open fall rush was also discussed. Open rush signup closes Thursday night and open rush begins on October 10.



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
