

'Black Power' Key Topic...

since whites are in the power positions," DeBerry said, quoting Carmichael. DeBerry said Negro unemployment and poverty are the result of white power. "Black power means that we want the political power to make the decisions that affect our lives."

"Where are you going to get it?" Ross asked.

"Take it from those who've got it, according to Carmichael," DeBerry replied.

"I don't reject Black power," Ross said. "It's possible by disobedience to persuade, but I don't think it does. I think it alienates people. That's self-alienation," DeBerry replied.

Contrary to white fears, DeBerry said, "Negroes who have made it are not hostile or retaliatory to whites. Negroes will not treat whites as whites have treated Negroes."

Use of Violence

Ross took issue with the use of violence as part of black power. "We can certainly be forgiven if we think the recent riots are an example of black power."

"Those who are most adept at violence are also those who are

least principled," DeBerry said. DeBerry replied that that made George Washington an evil man for using violence. He said the Watts riots were expected by whites for the past decade and could have been prevented by action on jobs and schools, but no white persons lifted a finger.

The first time many people in Watts felt like human beings was after they realized they could riot, according to DeBerry.

Ross said he couldn't believe people could suddenly find themselves human beings because they were violent. "Rather it makes them less human." He called violence "degrading."

Decent Housing

A member of the audience of about 60 asked if whites are not doing violence to Negroes by keeping them out of jobs and decent housing.

DeBerry said, "Being shot is nothing to living in a ghetto and coming home from a two-bit job and seeing your children eaten by rats."

"Let's not mix terms," Ross

said. "I deplore that, but it's not violence."

"It has the same kind of life expectancy," DeBerry replied.

At this point a member of the audience accused Ross of middle of the road hypocrisy for not offering something else to effect change, yet objecting to black power.

Ross replied that there is "an essential difference between civil disobedience and revolution."

Negroes are thinking in terms of revolution, DeBerry said. "CORE and SNCC have taken a new position of civil disobedience." They now say they "will defend themselves." DeBerry added, "This prevents violence."
