

Ducks Win...

protected their slim lead by stopping a succession of Stanford scoring drives.

After the kickoff the Indians moved for a first down on Oregon's 17 in a drive sparked by fullback Jack Root's 28 yard burst.

Defense Stands

But here the Duck line refused to allow any more yardage. First Temple stopped Lewis after four yards. Then Molter stopped Root for a yard and on a third and four situation Klein broke through the blockers on a pitch out and nailed Lewis for a three yard loss.

Shoemaker's ensuing field goal attempt from 21 yards out was wide to the left, and, for a while anyway, Duck fans could breathe a little easier.

On the next series of downs Oregon was forced to punt and Stanford mounted another scoring threat.

The Indians moved to Oregon's 31 before this drive was stopped. McRae held Washington to two yards and Klein broke up a pass. Then McRae, who was by this time beginning to look familiar in Stanford's backfield, threw Washington for a big 11 yard loss.

On the next play, with Stanford punting on a fourth and 19 situation from the 40, confusion arose that nearly proved disastrous for the Ducks.

Holding Called

On the punt Oregon was called for holding and the officials, unsure of the original line of scrimmage, were ready to award Stanford a first down on the Oregon 19.

Play was halted for nearly five minutes as the officials consulted the head statistician. Stanford was finally awarded the ball on the 25 but this time with fourth down and four yards to go for a first down.

Shoemaker again tried a field goal but this one was blocked by Temple and Oregon took over on their own seven, where another sophomore, Eric Olson took over for the Ducks.

"I was a little leary about putting him in when we were that deep," Casanova admitted afterwards. Olson had had little time to warm up.

His concern was merited on Olson's first two plays. He fumbled on the first one and then ran into Jones on a handoff.

Indians Threaten

As the third quarter ended the Ducks punted from their own nine as once again Stanford began to threaten to puncture the end zone.

On the Oregon 23 Chuck Williams took over at the Stanford helm and brought the Indians to the 29 where Washington replaced him.

Two plays later the Ducks again rose to the challenge and pressured Washington into throwing early, enabling Jim Smith to pick off the pass and return it to the 42. It was Smith's third interception of the year.

Olson then bounced back from his near disastrous first series of downs and calmly led the Ducks to Stanford's 18 before Jones was stopped short of a first down on a fourth down screen pass.

Oregon's drive took nine plays and used up time which the Indians vitally needed.

The next two times Stanford got the ball they were forced to punt. McRae and Molter dropped Washington for a 12 yard loss to force one punt and three incomplete passes forced another.

With time running out and the Ducks in possession it looked like all the Ducks had to do was keep the ball.

Oregon fumble on Stanford's 35.

But with less than a minute left Stanford got another chance when John de la Forest recovered an A Williams pass to Bob Conrad moved the ball to the 45 and tension mounted as thought of previous last minute Stanford wins filled the stands.

However a holding penalty against Stanford brought the ball back to the 20 and the Ducks forced three straight incompletes, nearly intercepting one pass.

A last second desperation pass from Lewis to Conrad was completed at the Oregon 45, but Jim Smith hauled the Stanford end down immediately and before a small crowd of 17,000 the Ducks had their first 1966 win.
