

UT to Present German Classic, 'Nathan the Wise'

"Nathan the Wise," a German classic in the spirit of the 18th century enlightenment, runs tonight only as the first presentation of a German language play at the University.

The widely-traveled "Die Brucke" Ensemble from Munich is sponsored by the Goethe Institute, in Munich, the University Theatre and the Student Union Board.

An extensive program in English will be provided for theatregoers with no German or whose knowledge of German is rusty.

PLEA FOR TOLERANCE

"Nathan the Wise" is G. E. Lessing's plea for tolerance which he wrote as the outcome of his controversy with the religious bigot Pastor Goeze of Hamburg. Faring badly against his opponent's superior intellect and wit, Pastor Goeze used his influence to have Lessing's writings banned. Lessing then turned to the stage as a medium for promoting religious tolerance.

Lessing pleads for tolerance and understanding on the ground that no religion is superior to another and that brotherhood among men is what really counts. Peter Luhr in the title role gives an excellent portrayal of the good, wise,

decent, yet shrewd and successful Jewish merchant. His Nathan was not an Old Testament figure, but a sophisticated and sceptical man of the world who understands human frailties.

STORY OF 'THREE RINGS'

The action takes place in Jerusalem during the time of the crusades. The bridge of friendship between the ruling Sultan and the Jewish merchant is found in the "story of the rings." Asked by the Sultan which religion is the true one, Nathan answers with the parable of the three rings which are so similar that there is no way of deciding which is the most valuable. Thus, he says they are all equal before God and the best works most strongly for "love free from prejudices."

The actors of the troupe are highly trained performers whose skills reflect the finest in German theatrical art. Having performed in plays ranging from "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf" to the great stage classics, they come from all over the German speaking world, from both East and West Germany, Austria and Switzerland.

UO Receives Speech Grants

The University has received three federal grants for training in the field of speech pathology and audiology, according to Kenneth Scott Wood, professor of speech and director of the University's speech and hearing clinic, who will direct the training program.

The Neurological and Sensory Disease Service of the Public Health Service has awarded the University a grant of \$95,000 for a cooperative training program with the University Medical School in Portland. The grant allows for the training of eight fellows at the doctoral level.

The University has also received a \$26,392 grant from the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration in Washington, D.C., for the training and support of five students working toward masters degrees. The program is designed for training people for work with adults who have speech handicaps. The third grant from the U.S.

Office of Education allows for the training and support of four fellows working toward a masters degree. The program, under a \$16,800 grant, is aimed at the preparation of professional personnel in the education of handicapped children.

Teachers Receive Tax Credits

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CPS)—Teachers are not going to have to pay taxes on money they spend educating themselves after all.

An overwhelmingly hostile reaction from congress and the nation's teachers has forced the Internal Revenue service to back down from proposed regulations that would have prohibited taxpayers from deducting the cost of post-graduate education from their gross income.

IRS regulations are usually put into effect 30 days after their proposal, unless there are objections. This time the rules did not make it.

Recreational Facilities Criticized by Mohr

"If students ever take to the streets in protest at this university, the igniter won't be disapproval of the faculty or administration, but the inadequate recreational facilities here," Fred Mohr, assistant to the dean of the Graduate School and Democratic candidate for the state legislature, stated Friday in an interview.

Commenting on the present shake-up of priority positions for new buildings under the Oregon State Board of Higher Education, he said, "this situation has resulted in a fantastic disservice to students at the University."

The 36-year-old member of the Building Planning Commission added that he has always argued to change the priority listings and will continue to do so if elected.

Pollution Problem of Concern

Mohr, who classifies himself as a liberal, is running for his first elective office. In 1964, he served on Secretary-Treasurer Robert Straub's executive campaign committee. Having received a University degree in chemistry, he has a more than ordinary concern over the air pollution problem. He admits to being a "nut" on the air and water pollution question and is worried about the ineffectiveness of current programs.

Mohr was disappointed that the legislature was unable to vote on the one and one-half per cent property tax limitation because a vote would demonstrate its clear rejection of the measure. "The thrust of the one and one-half per cent move has been recognized," he said, "and the Democratic Party in Oregon has pledged to promote fair property tax relief."

Loss of Control, Support

"The bill destroys local control for school programming and support of municipal government, throwing the budgeting power into a three man education commission," Mohr pointed out.

One of Mohr's pet peeves is the equity principle now used for appropriations to state schools. "There is a need for a new system of evaluating programs. The present system has little sufficiency in translating need into dollars; a new formula is needed to expand this connection," he said.

Maiden to Discuss Problems of Objectors

Hank Maiden, field secretary for the central committee of Conscientious Objectors to Military Service will discuss current problems of the conscientious objector and talk individually to students at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the Student Union.

Maiden will speak again at 8 p.m. at Eugene Friends Meeting House (Quaker), 2274 Onyx St.

"One cannot equate smaller schools with a large, national university like Oregon or Oregon State," he went on to say. "What would be more practical is an independent evaluation commission which would make value judgments." He illustrated this point with the example of Portland State College competing with the University for a good physics department when there isn't enough money to create a decent physics department at a smaller college.

Mohr is also a great proponent of community colleges which he says prepare individuals for the "smokeless industries," jobs of the future, with a high literacy rate.

When asked if he sees any chance of a Republican comeback, he answered, "Very little. The only changes might be in the 16 seats that the Democrats picked from Lane county, one of which is his."

Print Collection To Be Exhibited

An exhibition and sales of original lithographs, etchings, woodcuts, and serigraphs will be held from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. today in the gallery of the Student Union.

The collection is that of London Grafica Arts. It includes some 300-400 works by Chagall, Daumier, Picasso, Renoir, Toulouse-Lautrec and many other distinguished artists, and ranges historically from 15th century woodcuts to contemporary British and French printmakers.

The works in the exhibition - sale were collected by Eugene Schuster, who studied for more than three years under Professor Gombrich at the Warburg Institute at England's London University.

Many of the items will be of particular interest to collectors. Prices range from \$10 up.

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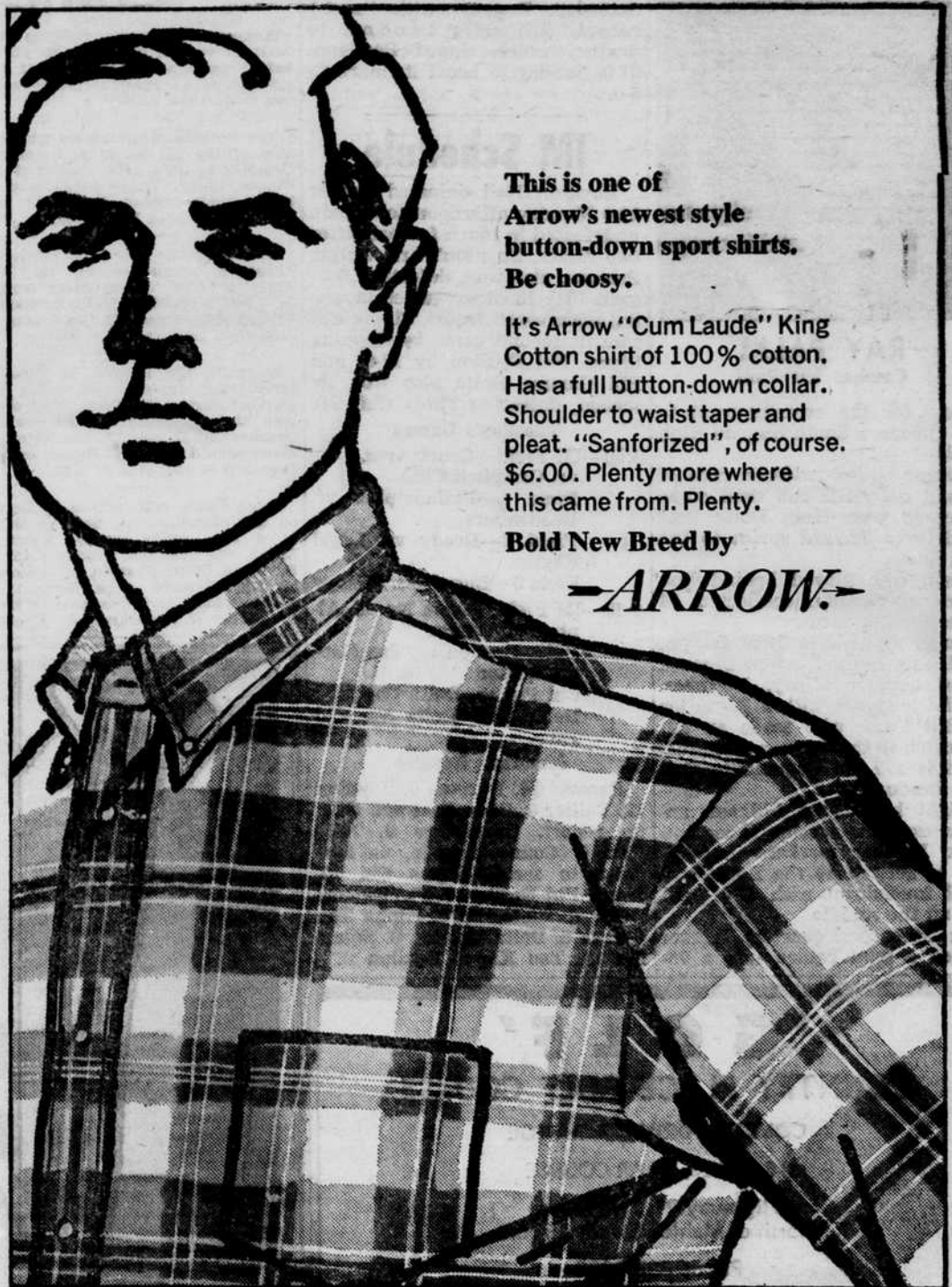
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
