

Cas: Gridders Did Tremendous Job

"There was no doubt about it, our kids came to play and did a tremendous job," said head football coach Len Casanova at the Oregon Club Luncheon in the Eugene Hotel Monday.

"From a defensive standpoint, we played a tremendous game, made some real solid tackles, and showed a lot of hustle."

Cas, speaking to a large crowd, was referring to the job his Ducks did in beating Stanford 7-3 Saturday.

Both offensively and defensively, he said, the boys played well. "One of my most satisfying victories in years," he said.

That win ended two years of frustration against the Big Red, and stopped a seven-game Oregon losing string.

Cas had nothing but praise for his mighty Ducks. "We came to play," he said. "A lot of people

have been down on us, but we are a good team, and showed it."

Cas singled out defensive players Cam Molter, George Dames, and Harry Cartales for some fine plays. Secondary men Tim Temple, Ken Klein, and Jim Smith were awarded plaudits from John Robinson during second quarter films which were shown at the end of the program.

Cas also mentioned that the game contained a lot of breaks—both good and bad—for the Ducks.

"We got ours, but there were some for both teams," he said.

The Ducks coach also felt that the Ducks did a good job of containing Stanford's potent offense, especially quarterback Gene Washington.

"We defended Washington, and we defended him well," noted the smiling Cas. Cas also praised fullback Jack Root of the Indians, crediting him with a fine perform-

ance and rating him as a hard runner. "We did a good job on him, too."

Looking at the offense, Cas said that history had possibly been made. "We haven't had a back carry the ball 31 times in a long time, maybe never." He was referring to the Duck's classy fullback Steve Jones.

"Jones is not nifty, nor great, but a good blocker, a good, solid, hard runner. He is a punishing back," rated Cas.

Casanova and his staff were extremely pleased with Barnes and his ability to come up with the big play, especially on key third down situations.

He singled out Barnes and Left Hendrickson for the pass completion that helped the Ducks to a score. It was a batted aerial that spun like a top with Hendrickson grabbing it away from an Indian defender at the last second.

"Lefty is a likable guy, very enthusiastic, and one who always gives a real effort. He did a tremendous job for us," added Cas. Others garnering praise in-

cluded Ross Carter and Bill Smith for their tremendous blocking on the line and Kent Grote's crushing blocks from his fullback position in his first start as a Duck.

Cas had only one complaint, that of his punting. "We have a problem which needs to be shored up. I've given it over to my assistants to let them work on," said Cas.

Injuries, always an Oregon nemesis seemed at a low point for once.

George Dames got a good wrap from trainer Bob Officer and reported he felt better at the end of the game after all the hard

knocks, than when when he entered early in the first quarter.

Mike Barnes got a bump on the noggin but was reported fit for practice.

However, Claxton Welch and Arlan Elms are doubtful for the Air Force contest as a result of injuries sustained earlier last week. However, Cas noted that the situation could change any time during the week.

Referring to the injuries Cas said, "sometimes when the kids are playing hard, a little over-their-heads, they never get hurt."

Scout Bruce Snyder took a brief turn at the stand and gave a prognosis for the Air Force game.

"They're a real challenge, they're good. It's going to be a real tough game. They are big, well coached, and they feel they now have size," noted Snyder.

He pointed out that Falcon quarterback Sonny Litz is a direct contrast to last year's star Paul Stein. He is over 200 pounds and stands 6-2. Stein was about 5-8 and just 150 pounds. "He can throw real well," added Snyder.

The Falcons depend on split end Jim Shultz to catch most of Litz's aeriels. The 6-2, 200 pound end has hauled in 15 passes for over 250 yards so far this season.

"The Air Force will put most of their basket of eggs in their stoutest defense, which they contend is their best asset," said Snyder.

"With everyone on the defense at least a one year letterman, and some with two year's of experience, the Falcons certainly must be considered an experienced team in that department."

Lloyd Duncan—who holds down the defensive line—is 6-3, 240, and one of the biggest Falcons at the Academy.

Snyder mentioned that the Duck's main problem will be the many defenses the Air Force will throw at them.

"They'll try to make us make mistakes," Snyder said.

Ex-Ducks Sparkle In Bomber's Win

The Eugene Bombers' kick-off crew got a good work-out Saturday night at Tacoma.

By the time the final buzzer had sounded, Eugene had kicked off to the Tyees eight times.

Their seven touchdowns and five successful PAT boots plus a strong defensive effort gave the Bombers a 47-0 trouncing of their hosts.

As usual, ex-Oregon members of the squad played key roles in the victory, although high point

The closest Tacoma came to scoring was in the final two minutes, when it reached the Eugene five. Their efforts were stopped, however, by a tough Bomber defense, dominated by three members of the Casey's Commandos of 1964, namely Tim Casey, Jack Clark and Ancer Haggerty.

Next action for the Bombers will be at Victoria, B. C., this Saturday. Eugene, with its 4-1 record, still rates second to Seattle, which ripped Portland, 27-0, Sunday to boost its mark to 5-0.
