Paid No Taxes

Emerald Editor:
Noting your editorial "Give Them a Break" in the October 6, 1966 issue of the Emerald, I felt I must call some facts to your attention. You were apparently not aware of these facts when the editorial was written. It is true that, in principle, Oregon residents in the armed services are subject to state taxation.

They are, however, given an exemption on the basis of that service. This is, I believe, as it should be. Those in the armed forces, particularly in the lower enlisted grades, have a severely limited income.

Income from active service pay is considered exempt from taxation by the State of Oregon up to the amount of \$3,000. This

is clearly stated in the Oregon State income tax filing instructions, Part One, Exempt Income, Paragraph 7.

It might also be pointed out that those on active duty in the armed forces receive fringe benefits which help them offset the cost of living.

These benefits are not considered as taxable income. Also, those with incomes of more than \$3,000 are usually career officers or enlisted personnel with higher base incomes and longevity pay. These persons can, and very often do, change their state of residence as they pursue a military career.

From personal experience I can say that I paid not a cent of income tax to the State of Oregon during my tour of active duty as a draftee.

Your argument for federal tax exemptions might have more merit were it not for the fact that armed service members now serving in a combat zone pay no federal income tax. This legal provision was enacted by Congress last year and is retroactive for combat service in Viet Nam.

Your argument loses considerable appeal when the facts on which it is based are inaccurate or incomplete. It is your privilege to champion a cause, but it seems pointless to do so if the objectives of that cause have already been attained.

Jump off the deep end if you must. It's wise to check the water level in the pool before you do.

SOC Teacher Fired For Oath Refusal

PORTLAND (AP)—Paul Adamian, English professor at Southern Oregon College in Ashland, was fired because of complaints that his classes contained too much "sex, liquor, and revolution," according to a statement in a report from the Oregon Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) over Adamian's refusal to sign a loyalty oath.

The ACLU report said Adamian and his division and department chairman were not told of the four complaints.

"It was said that in his teaching," said the ACLU, "Mr. Adamian encouraged his students to challenge their parents' way of doing things, and to 'try on' any beliefs that attracted them, even to changing the form of government."

The ACLU said Adamian was earlier dismissed by SOC President Elmo Stevenson over Adamian's refusal to sign the loyalty oath.

The ACLU said college officials reconsidered and told Adamian he would be rehired.

Then, the ACLU said, Stevenson learned of a letter Adamian had written to the State Federation of the American Association of University Professors, reviewing events of the loyalty oath controversy, which saw the Faculty Council resign April 13 in support of Adamian.

The ACLU said Stevenson then wrote a letter to Adamian, again dismissing him, stating as his reasons the four complaints.
