

High School Journalists To Hear Duncan, Benz

A former dean of the School of Journalism at the University, Charles T. Duncan, and an assistant professor in the School of Journalism at the State University of Iowa, Lester G. Benz, will be among the featured speakers at the 40th annual high school press conference Friday and Saturday at the University.

Some 1,000 students and advisers are expected to attend.

Duncan, who is associate dean of faculties at the University, will speak at the Friday luncheon on the topic, "If You Like Oysters."

Duncan joined the faculty of the University's School of Journalism in 1950 and was named dean in 1956. In 1962 he became dean of the University of Colorado School of Journalism. He returned to the University in his present capacity in 1965.

FORMER SECRETARY

He is a former executive secretary of the Oregon Scholastic Press Association. He had served in various capacities with newspapers in Minnesota and taught at three universities before coming here.

Benz is executive secretary of Quill and Scroll, national high school journalism society with headquarters at the State University of Iowa.

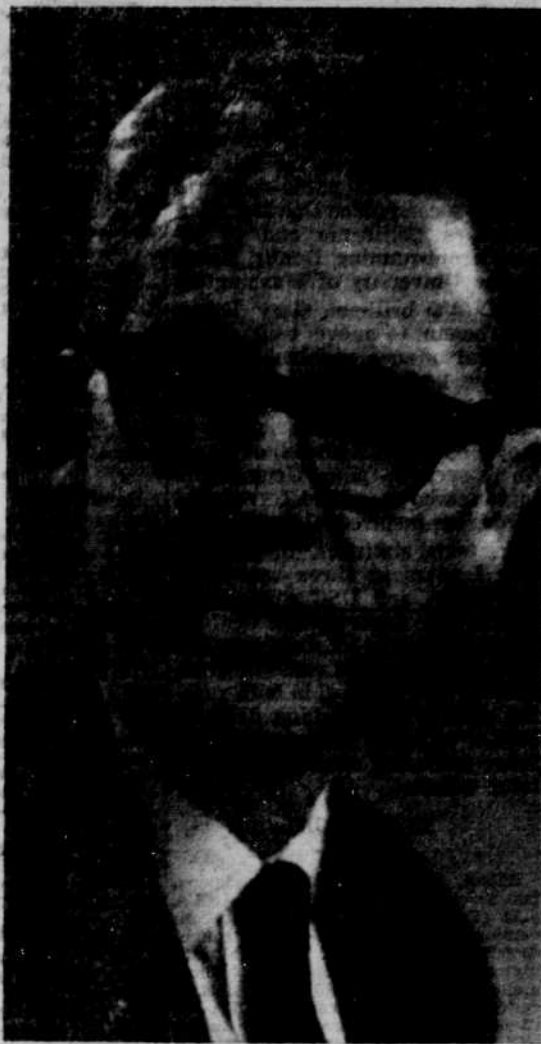
He has participated in three newspaper study missions in Europe; in 1960, on both sides of the Iron Curtain; in 1962, to all members of the Common Market; and in 1963 to all Communist countries in Europe.

PROFESSIONAL HELP

The two-day press conference is designed to give both high school students and their advisers professional help with problems of newspaper and yearbook production as well as insight into careers in the field of journalism.

There will be displays and exhibits, advisers meetings, section meetings, luncheon and banquet speakers, student roundtables and a concluding general session.

A special feature will be professional panels on such topics as selling yearbook and newspaper advertising, yearbook design and photography, news, editorial and feature writing, and journalism careers.

Photography Class Work On Display

Outstanding student photography at the University may be viewed through October 30 in the Photography of Oregon gallery at the University's Museum of Art.

The photographs were chosen from student work done during a 1965-66 photography class taught by Bernard L. Freemesser, associate professor of journalism.

The student work reflects a variety of disciplines and interests, as the class was not restricted to journalism majors and drew students of many different backgrounds.

The show will be exhibited by invitation at colleges and universities throughout the United States under the auspices of the Society for Photographic Education.

Rooms Available At College Inn

Accommodations for some 125 students remain at The College Inn, according to Wyeth Williams, resident manager.

The College Inn, a privately owned and operated student dormitory at 1000 Patterson Street, is a seven-story structure with a capacity of 496 students.

It features completely furnished private or semiprivate rooms with a private bath, wall-to-wall carpeting, specially-designed furniture, soundproofing, study lounges, and recreation rooms with color television.

Rooms for both men and women students rent from \$900 to \$1,239 per school year, depending on the size of the room. The average price, board and room included, is about \$1,000, Williams said.

The College Inn is more like a

hotel than a dormitory. "We are a guest-oriented student living facility, not a dormitory," says Williams. "The students are our guests and we plan to make their stay with us a highlight of their University experience."

At present, The College Inn's student body is composed primarily of University students, although students from Northwest Christian College and Lane Community College also live there. The College Inn will house students of every class except freshmen.

The College Inn, other than being on the approved housing list, has no official relationship with the University.
