Now that at least two people have taken it upon themselves to blast the idea of the Amazon Residents' Committee, perhaps it is time that we as members try to define our roles as we see them. As extremists and agitators we are particularly concerned with the following issues:

We are appalled at the speed at which individuals drive through the project and are seeking constructive answers to this problem. Even extremists tend to love their children.

We would like to see the construction of more and improved play area for children in order to keep them off the freeway through the project. We realize that there is a good deal of expense in such a scheme and are willing to provide labor and ideas for such a play area.

We have requested, and have been granted, a newsletter from the physical plant and housing office which outlines improvements and changes to be made in the immediate future. We merely would like to be able to plan for inconveniences such as water shutoffs. (One woman was so irrational as to be concerned when she was unable to

feed her baby due to the lack of water.)

Like other extremists, we resent the invasion of privacy which has so frequently taken place in the past by members of the physical plant. Men have often either knocked or not entered immediately. As agitators we would like to have time to get out of the shower and throw a towel around ourselves before confronting workmen.

These then are some of the major issues with which we have been concerned. I might add that Mr. Thorpe, head of the married student housing office, has expressed great willingness to work with us on demands such as these. In fact, he was pleased that his office will have some way of finding out the concerns of residents of Amazon.

At our last informal meeting, we irrational malcontents agreed that, unlike ex-resident Browning, the majority of us were quite pleased to live here in Amazon where we are relatively free to do as we wish with our apartments.
