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Meet Air Force Saturday

Ducks Hoping for Upset

Oregon's football team took off from Mahlon Sweet Airport at 9 a.m. today en route to Colorado Springs where they hope to win their second consecutive victory when they meet the high-flying Falcons of the Air Force Academy Saturday at 12:30 p.m. P.D.T.

Coach Ben Martin's team has

yet to defeat Oregon in three previous gridiron clashes, but national oddsmakers expect the Falcons to reverse that trend Saturday.

Air Force has won three straight games after an opening loss to Wyoming, is ranked in the Associated Press' top 20, and is an improved team over last year

when they tied the Ducks 18-18 at Portland.

Regular Falcon quarterback Steve Turner is expected to start after being out for a week with a knee injury—and he has hit on 43 of his 85 pass attempts this season.

Backup men Craig Baier and Steve Turner are both above the 60 per cent mark.

Oregon was a decisive underdog when the two teams first met in 1959. But the Ducks, after spotting the Falcons an early 3-0 lead, ran roughshod over the Cadets, beat them 20-3, and snapped a 14-game Air Force winning streak.

The next time the two teams met was in 1963 at Colorado Springs when Oregon broke a 14-14 halftime tie to win 35-20 and spoil the inauguration of the Falcons' new stadium.

Last year Air Force, with quarterback Paul Stein doing everything but fly, came from behind for that tie.
