

Casanova, Chapman Sport Broad Smile

Smiles were the biggest thing going at Monday's Oregon Club luncheon. Varsity Coach Len Casanova and freshman Coach Norm Chapman, both brought home winners.

"You know, it's kind of fun to get up here with a smile on your face two weeks in a row," grinned Cas. His Ducks dumped the high flying Air Force Academy Falcons 17-6 with a "surprise attack."

"That 17 point lead threw all the coaches off track; everyone was confused," joked Cas. Of course they weren't really con-

fused but Cas related that it was a "strange feeling" to be so far out in front so early in the game.

Casanova and the staff had decided to try and put the Falcons in the hole. "There was quite a wind, so we kicked off, hoping to hold them deep."

Cunningham Connects

With the Ducks holding a 7-0 lead, Cas related his intentions to go for the field goal on fourth down. "Gunther get in there and kick a field goal." Gunther Cunningham responded with two things: "A what?", and a 42 yard school record for field goals.

Cas went on to praise his offensive and defensive units. "The defensive kids really had to play a lot; they were good, but not quite as sharp as last week."

"Actually, I am very very pleased with the pass defense. Robbie (defensive backfield coach John Robinson) has really done a good job," said Cas.

One boy stood out — Kenny Klein, who set a school interception return record with a 99 yard gallop of a second quarter pass. According to Cas, "He did a fine job."

Tim Temple, Pat Helfrich, and

George Dames were also singled out for praise. "Temple made 13 unassisted tackles and really had a fine day out there," Cas smiled. "All the kids really came through in the key situations."

Elms Still Ailing

No one was hurt according to the Duck coach and everyone is set for the Washington encounter except for possibly Arlan Elms who is nursing a tender leg.

About the Huskies, Cas fears them more than any single team on the schedule. "They're a real tough opponent, and they will be tougher after losing to Cal, a game they thought they'd win," he finished.

Fresh coach Norm Chapman had a two-fold chore, relating his own game and issuing a scouting report on the Huskies.

"The game was kind of a rout," he noted in a big understatement. His Ducklings mauled the WSU Couababes, 33-0.

"We have to shore-up our extra point kicking; it's just got to be better," he lamented.

He related his attempts to share a "mutual aid" pact with the WSU coach—a sort of relating their formation, because it was the first game for both teams.

"They said to expect a five-two defensive formation but came out in a wide six," related Chapman. "So we played as though it were a five-two, acting as if we didn't know the difference." Chapman praised quarterbacks

Tom Blanchard and John Herrington for their fine signal calling plus the running of backs Allan Pitcaithley and Andy Maurer.

The Duckling defense, which limited the visitors to just 13 yards total offense was equally praised.

"The Huskies will be the best team we've played to date," said Chapman. "We'll have to play as well or better than we did against Stanford to beat them."

Chapman Sees Strength

Looking at the Husky personnel Chapman noted the running of Donnie Moore, the passing of Tom Sparlin, and the receiving of Jim Cope and Dave Williams, as the heart of their attack.

"Moore is fast, hard to bring down, and strong," he said. Sparlin is an outstanding quarterback but tends to be a little erratic at times. His chief targets are Williams and Cope."

Cope is a little faster and quicker than Williams with fine break away speed once he gets the ball, but Williams is taller and can get higher in the air.

"In order to win, we'll have to hit harder and be quicker than they are," finished Chapman.

Palm, Daniels Lead Bombers to 23-6 Win

VICTORIA, B. C. (Special) — Former Oregon grid stars Ray Palm and Roger Daniels guided a weary but determined Eugene Bomber eleven to a 23-6 win over Victoria Saturday.

Although the players had a long trip Friday and received only four or five hours of sleep before catching the Port Angeles-Victoria ferry, they still came through with their fifth Pacific Football League victory in six outings.

Palm emerged as the key figure in the effort by scoring all three touchdowns, two on passes from Daniels and the third on an aerial from Doug Post. For the season, Palm has five TD passes.

The Bombers picked up five more points on two successful PAT kicks and a field goal by Tom Roach of Portland.

Roach's field goal early in the second quarter opened the scoring. Sparking the Bombers' drive to the Victoria four were Hugh Oldham's 5-yard punt return and a Daniels to Bill Ford 15-yard aerial.

Eugene boosted the score to 10-0 by halftime with a 38-yard pass play. Daniels rolled out to

his right and connected with Palm, who stepped in from the two.

Daniels set up the next Bomber marker, when, on a fourth and one situation on his own 30, he sprinted around left end to the Steeler 45.

He led his mates to the 16, after which he called a pass play. His receivers were covered, so he took advantage of a hole in the Victoria line for a nine-yard gain. Two plays later he faked to Winn and came up with a five-yard play pattern pass to Palm in the end zone.

On the ensuing kickoff, Major Lincoln, a former Oregon State player, made an 82-yard return to give Victoria six points. The two-point conversion try failed.

In the fourth quarter, Eugene took over on downs on the Steelers 48 and began a three-play touchdown drive. A Daniels to Oldham reverse play provided 14 yards, after which Daniels was hit for a loss of three.

Post then found Palm in the end zone and threw 37 yards to the all-coast end for the final Bomber score. The kick was blocked.

A brilliant pass interception runback by defensive halfback John Ripper almost gave the visitors another six points, but the play was nullified by a roughing the passer penalty. With about a minute left in the game, Ripper intercepted on his own 45.

This week the Bombers prepare for league-leading Seattle.
