

VISTA Aims At Self-Help

"The poor don't ask for help, because they don't know how to ask," says Pat Morales, VISTA committee co-ordinator.

A one-time VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) volunteer, Morales says that is why VISTA was set up—to help the people to help themselves, to provide youth with the opportunity and the motivation to learn and hope for the future, to provide training and the opportunity to work and to provide individuals the opportunity to live in decency and dignity.

The new VISTA committee, set up under the auspices of the ASUO OP-CIT program and sponsored by campus VISTA, has been sponsoring VISTA week which lasts until Thursday. A program including speakers, movies, and an information table on the SU terrace has been under way since Monday.

To Acquaint Community

According to Morales, the week is to "get across to people what sort of things are going on, because people don't really know what community action is or what they can do about it."

VISTA, or the domestic Peace Corps, is a program under the Office of Economic Opportunity Act which was passed in 1964. The only eligibility requirements are that the volunteers be 18 and "they be dedicated and sincere people who want to work against poverty."

Usually a trainee is given six weeks of training in the field and classroom and then is sent out to work and live in the field for a year. They receive a subsistence check to pay for room and board and incidentals and a \$50 per month stipend which is held for them until their year is terminated.

Federal Funds

Funds for these expenses are allocated by the Federal government.

The VISTA training site at the University is located in Omega hall and the staff is composed of professionals in social work.

Since the Lane County Youth Project had already been set up in this area, the VISTA program was incorporated into it, furnishing trained volunteers to help the community action programs in Lane County. These programs have given birth to new ideas and ways to deal with social as well as economic problems of the community through the co-operation of local agencies and organizations.

These programs include Neighborhood Youth Corps, Community Organization Action Program (COAP), Project Headstart, Family Service, and many more.

One of these programs—COAP—brought to the first meeting of

the VISTA committee a cry for help. COAP works with the ADC mothers (Aid to Dependent Children) in the area. Various programs such as hair care, home canning, sewing, marriage counseling, baby sitting, and even an emergency ambulance program have been started by this organization.

Works With Mothers

COAP also works with the ADC mothers on budgeting and this is where the emphasis is being put.

Four basic problems were outlined by COAP at the meeting:

- The ADC budget is based on 1957 cost of living standards and is inadequate to live on.
- There is no allowance for adult dental care, except for emergency extractions.
- The housing allowance is \$54 for one child, which must include all costs of housing—rent, utilities, etc., and a mother with five or more children receives \$74 maximum.
- Family allowances are cut if a child earns over \$120 a year.

Because of the need for volunteers right away, a committee grew out of the VISTA Action Committee. The first meeting is at 8 p.m. today in the SU. Its purpose is to recruit and activate volunteers for community service. Everyone interested is invited to come and those who are unable to come should contact Pat Morales through the OP-CIT office, 305 SU.

The committee is open to all persons and groups interested in working in anti-poverty programs.

as a marketplace in which students are customers, faculty are salesmen and "knowledge" is the neatly packaged product?

Before students can institute effective curriculum reforms, which change the University structure, such fundamental questions must be asked. As well as asking questions of the administration, student leaders should ask questions of fellow students.

This year there should be an empirical study (with a random sample) of the student body, gauging opinions, not only of curriculum reforms, but also basic educational philosophy.

Are students really satisfied with the spoon-fed lecture system, or would they respond to a more personal, unstructured learning situation if given the chance? An accurate sample of, perhaps five per cent of the student body would be a helpful guide to specific proposals for the rest of the school year.
