

Graduate Council To Ask Recognition

In their first meeting of the 1966-67 school year, the Graduate Student Advisory Council voted unanimously to seek Student Activities recognition. In seeking recognition as an organization, the group also voted to change their name to the Graduate Student Council.

Tentative problems for consideration during the coming months include:

- Development of the construction
- Position on the Aberle motion
- Desirability of pass-fail courses for graduate students
- Ph.D. language exams
- Married student housing
- Campus parking vs. shuttle-bus for the housing areas
- Extent of graduate student participation in determination of

administrative and curricular policies.

Eugene Hogan, a political science major, was elected to fill the vacancy of chairman for the fall term. Rhody Rodolico, a Business Administration major, is vice chairman.

The Graduate Student Advisory Council (GSAC) was formed last year under the direction of J. Francis Rummel, associate dean of students for the graduate students, to act as a liaison between the administration and the graduate students.

GSAC, composed of two representatives from each of the seven professional schools and one representative from each of the 16 Liberal Arts departments, represents the "pulse of the graduate students in University operations," Rummel said.

In Region 14 Meet

Better Programs Conference Goal

Registration begins at 1 p.m. today as the Student Union Board plays host this weekend to the Region 14 Conference of College Unions. Approximately 200 delegates from student unions at 27 colleges and universities in Oregon, Washington, Western Canada, Alaska, Montana, and Idaho will attend. The conference closes Saturday afternoon.

Described by chairman Maurie Denner as a "learning situation," the conference is a gathering of students and staff people of member SU's in the 15 regions of the Association of College Unions International.

Ellingson Keynote Speaker

At tonight's banquet, Si Ellingson's keynote speech, "Meeting the Needs of Man," will serve as the underlying theme for the conference. Ellingson, head of the Oregon Development Fund, will focus on what the college student is today and what his needs are.

In this context, Friday morning's round of "pragmatic discussion topics" will examine the goals to be met in satisfying the recreational, cultural, and educational needs of today's college students.

Union's Role Analyzed

The second round of morning discussions will apply those goals to the student union. Student led groups will examine the ways in which the unions can meet the recreational, cultural, and educational requirements of the students.

Featured speakers at the Friday luncheon will be Miss Sara Preston, a Sargent Shriver Scholar in the Migrant Labor Project, and Miss Marlene Thompson of the YWCA.

Discussion programs in the afternoon will continue to analyze the role of the union in relation to the student. Such topics as film programming, publicity, performing arts, and recruitment and training of student personnel will be covered.

The Friday night banquet will also have a guest speaker, not yet announced. A special program, involving a singing group

from OSU, will provide delegates with special entertainment.

On Saturday morning, delegates will elect new officers to the Region 14 Board, and the conference will enter into its fourth phase on union programming.

It is these discussions that the real purpose of the conference will be developed. Denner said that "Some programs tend to get into a rut." Delegates will have a chance to correct this throughout the exchanges of new ideas based on past programs used by other unions and goals raised in discussions to meet the needs of today's students.

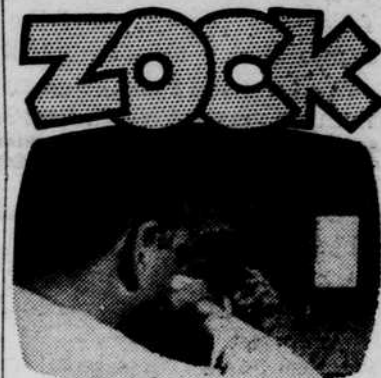

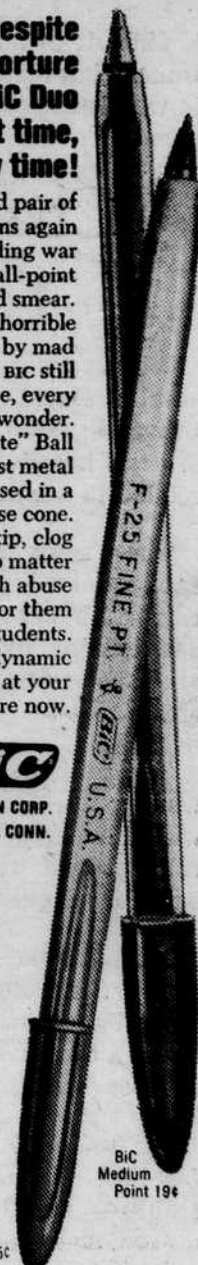
