

In Conduct Meeting

Committee Hears Sanctions Report

In other business Tuesday the Conduct Committee heard a report from Don Van Rossen, swimming coach and committee member, on a study he has made of the sanctions section of the code.

Van Rossen said he was "shocked" at what he discovered. He said there are two extremes in the sanctioning system at the University, ranging from expulsion or suspension to loss of privileges (a "campus") only. Van Rossen called for a type of punishment on a median between the two extremes.

He said he was opposed to physical work sanctions used last year and more in favor of social or monetary fines for infractions of University rules.

However, Francis Nickerson, associate dean of students, pointed out that the University couldn't legally collect a monetary fine if the student refused to pay it, according to the attorney general.

HAVE TO GO DOWNTOWN

"If a student refused to pay, we would have to take it downtown; and (other than parking fines) breaking University rules are not offenses of law," Nickerson said.

Van Rossen exploded: "I don't see how laws without enforcement can be effective. If we can't enforce rules, we might as well throw this book (Conduct Code) away!"

Nickerson said the most effective type of penalty used on this campus has been the work penalty. He said other institutions have held the threat of suspension closer to the students than the University.

Van Rossen suggested that the University should not "mess around" about disciplinary problems and should not hesitate about expelling students.

Van Rossen had two other objections to the Sanctions section. First, that there is no definition of what a student is. And second, students' disciplinary records don't follow them outside the University.

MESSED-UP OFFICES

Dean Nickerson reported that the case involving messed-up offices of graduate students was going before Student Court Tuesday on a charge of misuse of University property. He also reported the lowest incidence rate of disciplinary problems on campus in four years for the same period of time, with only two student court cases. Dean Nickerson attributed this decline in discipline problems partially to the increased number of men's mixed dormitory units. A mixed unit is one composed of students from all classes. Nickerson said there are ten of these this year compared to three last year.

Nickerson also observed that the highest rate of disciplinary problems originating from men's dorms are from freshman units and that the highest rate for women is from the upperclass dorms.

Ed Majors Get Placement Help

Students who expect to enter teaching or administrative work at the elementary, secondary, or college level at either mid-year or next fall may get help from the University Placement Service.

Two meetings for students going into these fields have been scheduled for next week:

- For college teaching, college or school administration or su-

pervision, counseling, and guidance—placement instructions at 4 p.m. Monday, in room 151 Education.

- For elementary, secondary, and junior college teaching — instructions at 4 p.m. Wednesday in room 151 Education.
