 sleuths from a local wax museum honoring the incomparable ingenuity of man for horrors of rare device. O'Neal is condemned to be hanged but escapes at the cost of axing off his hand. He captains a hooker (Laura Devon), then a hook and sundry other tools of truncation and plots the methodical deaths and rending of particular pounds of flesh from those that caught and condemned him.

But Dlanodcm's sorcerer tried too hard to be clever. It conjured something borrowed to make it something new and in good and artistic taste but failed to do anything but reveal juvenility in its old age.

The writers of the vision's dialogue seem to be convinced their product is professional as indicated by their attempts at flippancy in the tours of the museum and their fatal attempts at witticisms and punishing puns.

Heads Labeled

They make one character, for instance, say after the judge has been woefully decapitated, "He lost his head over a woman." And at another point, the main character Cesare Denoca is made to say about the demented miscreant, "When he comes after my head, he'll have to risk his own." Thus heads seem to have gone to the writers'. The script's subtlety is particularly overwhelming when the characters make their oh, so deft realizations that

—ah, ha—it IS the Baltimore strangler.

The attempt to be cute is never laid to rest.

Tony Curtis has to appear in a cameo role for about 15 wasted minutes.

Patrick O'Neal must try to build another corpse out of the severed sections of his victims.

When the villain is about to put them at peace and pieces, a red light must blink on and off and the soundtrack emit a shrill shriek in the vision first.

Wax Dummy

And he must—irony or ironies—get his due for what he's done by falling into the dagger of his wax dummy—in spite of the fact that that strained attempt at forcing art presupposes that the dummy must have been made of pretty rigid wax to receive—without the slightest shake—the impact of his body.

When the magician had finished, the two dejected visitors left Dlanodcm who put its tail between its legs and sadly slipped back in its cave.

Rotide Tnemniatretne Dlareme and his companion had fled Egelloc only to be offended by the bestial Xof and, though eagerly accepted by Dlanodcm and the sincere endeavors of its sorry sorcerer, bored by the heavy-handedness invoked in that hovel.
