

Pacifist to Talk At Y-Dialogue

Arlo Tatum, executive secretary for the Central Committee for Conscientious Objectors in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, will appear for a Y-Dialogue at 4 p.m. Tuesday in the Bottom-of-the-Bowl in the Student Union. He will also speak at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the Eugene Friends Meeting House, 2274 Onyx.

Tatum, long a conscientious objector to military service, has twice been imprisoned for "failure and refusal to register" for military draft.

Tatum has been active in War Registers International, serving as general secretary from 1955-1962. During that time he founded the first pacifist organization in Nigeria. He has participated in the War Registers League, and was a member of the American Friends Service Committee, through whose efforts he is appearing here.

McCall Addresses OEA Convention

There should be "no legal restrictions applying to political activities of teachers," asserted gubernatorial candidate Tom McCall Friday evening.

Speaking before convention delegates from the Department of Classroom Teachers of the OEA at the Eugene Hotel, McCall blasted the Little Hatch Act article of Oregon's Corrupt Practices Act.

Beginning his speech, McCall called the issue "a major matter of prime concern to your constituency," then defined the most important issues of this year's campaign as taxation, the Russian fishing fleet, and pollution of Northwest waters.

Moving into the topic of education, McCall recited statistics of national school attendance. He said that one third of the American people will soon be in school.

Narrowing his topic down to Oregon education, McCall cited four aspects of Oregon's "revolution in education."

He said that Oregon is the first state in the nation to use team

teaching on a broad basis and one of the first to test the effectiveness of educational television.

He described "project springboard," a project using audio-visual equipment, and discussed the inventory of Oregon libraries. He found a "deficiency in this particular area."

McCall spoke of his constant support in the past of political rights for teachers, then said that evidence showed we need to give "our corrupt practices act an overhauling."

He proposed revising election laws and advocated citizen participation.

Illness Kills OSU Girl

CORVALLIS (AP) — Cheryl Marie Oliver, an Oregon State University coed from Portland died Wednesday night, apparently of virus pneumonia.

Miss Oliver, 19, was found in her room at Callahan Hall, a women's dormitory.

She was taken by ambulance to a hospital, where she was pronounced dead.

Dr. P. H. Rozendal, Benton County health officer, said an autopsy indicated she probably died of virus pneumonia.
