

Viet Critic, Supporter, Pacifist to Talk at Confab

Three well-known experts in political science and foreign affairs will meet today in an all-afternoon conference in the Student Union Ballroom.
The men will speak individually beginning at 3 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. today, and will each answer questions following their speeches. They will meet for a panel discussion later in the evening.

Marc Raskin

Raskin, who will lead off the conference with his speech at 3 p.m., is considered an all-out critic of the Johnson administration's policy in Viet Nam.
He is presently the co-director of the Institute for policy studies in Washington, D.C., and is a trustee of Antioch College in Yellow Springs, Ohio.
During the past few years, Raskin has been a member of the Presidential Panel on Educational Research and Development, and a consultant in education to the Office of Science and Technology.
Former legislative counsel to 12 Democratic congressmen, and author, with Bernard Fall, of "The Viet Nam Reader," Raskin was a member of the United States' Disarmament Delegation to the 18-Nation Geneva Conference in 1962.
He is the author of several books — "After Twenty Years:

Alternatives to the Cold War in Europe" (with Richard J. Barnett 1965), and "Deterrence and Reality," 1961—and articles on education, disarmament, government, and foreign policy. His latest work, "Being and Doing," will be published next January.

Sanford Gottlieb

Gottlieb, generally regarded as a pacifist, was part of a fact-finding mission to South Viet Nam in 1965, sponsored by the Fellowship of Reconciliation.
He met with officials of both North and South Viet Nam while on the trip, and was instrumental in securing an agreement to deliver mail to U.S. prisoners of the Viet Cong.
He was named political action director of the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy (SANE) in 1960, and serves as a liaison between the Johnson administration and SANE in Washington.
Gottlieb has testified before congressional committees on such issues as nuclear test ban treaties, the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, United Nations bonds, and civil defense. He has appeared as a lecturer and in panel discussions throughout the United States.
Gottlieb led a 69-member tour of the Soviet Union in the summer of 1964.
Former editor of "Labor's

Daily," Gottlieb has contributed articles to the "Saturday Review," "The Reporter," "L'Observateur" of Paris, and the Milwaukee Journal, among other publications.

Robert Scalapino

Scalapino, head of the political science department at Stanford University, and editor of "Asian Survey" since 1962, is known as a spokesman for the Johnson administration's policy in Southeast Asia.
He participated in a national debate on Viet Nam one year ago, in place of former administrative policy consultant McGeorge Bundy.
Scalapino has studied Asian affairs under grants from the Ford Foundation, the Carnegie Foundation, the Social Research Council, and the Rockefeller Foundation, and has served as a science consultant in the Ford Foundation, the Rockefeller Brothers Fund, the Governmental Affairs Institute, and the American Assembly at Columbia University.
He has been a guest lecturer at the universities of Korea, Hong Kong, Manila, Malaya, and Japan.
His literary works include: "The Communist Revolution in Asia," "North Korea Today," and "Party Politics in Contemporary Japan."

Kennedy at Corvallis And Portland Today

Senator Robert K. Kennedy (D-N.Y.), who is on a nationwide campaign tour for Democratic candidates, will speak at 3:30 p.m. today at Oregon State University in Gill Coliseum.
Kennedy, in Oregon on behalf of Robert Duncan, Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, Congresswoman Edith Green, candi-

After his address in Portland Kennedy will fly to Spokane where he will attend a rally on Tuesday before continuing on his visit of six Western states.
Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall will also speak at the OSU campus on Monday in a dedication ceremony for the \$2.4 million Pacific Northwest Water Laboratory.

Senator Kennedy's speech, and one by Oregon Senatorial candidate Robert Duncan, will be broadcast live over both KWAX, University station, and over KOAC-FM and KOAP-FM, Oregon Educational radio, at 8 p.m. today.
