After the Mike Barnes-to-Lynn Hendrickson touchdown pass in the initial quarter, Washington launched a counter attack which propelled Jim Owens' men to the Webfoot two before the Duck defense stiffened. Martin entered the game and booted a 24-yard field goal.

Those three points, plus his PAT on UW's winning touchdown, combined with a 42-yard punting average made Martin indispensable to the Washingtonians.

Remove the Washington booster from the statistically even contest and Oregon would have had its third victory in succession, and second in a row in Pacific Athletic Conference play. They nearly had it, anyway.

After the game, Webfoot boss Len Casanova praised his defense, which came through with a capable effort.

"We didn't play as well defensively as against Stanford," Cas stated. "But, aside from a few lapses, we did keep Washington from making a successful sustained drive."

The purple-and-gold UW defenders were just as miserly as Oregon's stoppers. When Sparlin was resting on the sidelines—momentarily free of Webfoot harassment—the Husky gang was after Barnes.

Each time Oregon threatened to mount a serious offensive drive, Washington's defense

would throw someone for a loss, or break up a key pass. "Their inside safety gave us a lot of trouble," Casanova ventured, referring to Bob Pederson, the man who recovered the disastrous fourth-quarter fumble by Barnes.

Casanova cited the Huskies' ability to shoot an extra rusher through Oregon's pass blocking, pressuring Barnes (and later, Mike Brundage) to throw hurriedly.

After Washington scored the eventual winning TD in the fourth period, the Ducks came close to regaining the lead quickly when Barnes called the same play Oregon used to score in the first stanza.

From his own 41, Barnes rolled left, faked a pass to that sideline, then doubled back right, firing to Hendrickson 15-yards downfield. Lynn momentarily had the pigskin, but Washington safety Dave DuPree knocked the ball to the turf.

Again, in the closing seconds of the game, an Oregon drive was halted by the Washington backliners when the omnipresent Pederson picked-off an underthrown Brundage-to-Save Reina aerial.

Blanchard then tried four desperation passes before the clock ran out, giving the Rooks their first win of the year and the Ducklings their first loss.

Weren't Ready

"We weren't ready for the game and they were," muttered a dejected Frosh coach Norm Chapman.

Oregon State threatened in the first quarter, as the Rooks got to the Duck 22 before Steve Hilbert recovered a fumble on the 28. The Rooks threatened early in the second quarter also, as quarterback O'Conner led the Baby Beavers to the 12 before he fumbled with the recovery going to Henry Muller.

The Ducks never raised a threat in the first half, although Hilbert intercepted a pass on the Oregon State 24. But the Ducks couldn't move and had to punt after three plays.

The big problems for the Ducks were their inability to generate a consistent offense. "We'd get going, and then a penalty would kill us," noted Chapman. Another problem was the frequent dropped passes by Oregon receivers.

"Blanchard threw real well, but we couldn't hold onto the ball. And I don't think it was that cold, either."

Chapman had praise for Sinclair on defense. Sinclair, who was rated as one of the best high school backs in Oregon in the last 10 years, has been used sparingly on offense, but Chapman announced a change will be made. "He'll get more of a shot at offense now."

"Andy Mauer was also a hard runner for us," added Chapman.
