

Corvallis Gives Kennedy Warm Greeting

CORVALLIS (Special)—Senator Robert K. Kennedy (D-N.Y.), two hours late but still grinning, flew into this center of Oregon Republicanism Monday and got four standing ovations from a crowd of 7,500 people in Oregon State University's Gill Coliseum.

Big crowds delayed Kennedy on his jam-packed Western campaign tour and he spoke at 5:30 p.m., although scheduled to speak at 3:30 p.m.

There were still over 9,000 people there at 4:30 p.m. but many of them left when it was announced that Kennedy wouldn't arrive until after 5.

But when Kennedy, a deceptively boyish figure with a ruddy face and a shock of light brown hair that looks like it is about to turn gray, walked into the coliseum grinning and looking as if he were slightly bewildered at all the attention being given him, they all rose to applaud.

Praised LBJ and JFK

After a brief introduction by OSU Student Body President Housnu Ozyegin, and a second standing ovation, Kennedy started

to speak in a voice startlingly like his brother's.

The references to "President Kennedy," as he refers to his brother, were many and warm. The references to Lyndon Johnson were no less full of praise but they seemed to come out with a little more effort.

He spoke for only 15 minutes, apparently without much of a text, although he shuffled through a few tattered papers before he spoke.

His message was simple.

"First, I am in Oregon (he pronounces it Aaregin) because I am a Democrat and I support the Democratic ticket," he said, then followed that with a few words of praise for Congressman Robert B. Duncan, who is running for the U.S. Senate.

"He has worked hard for Oregon," Kennedy said. "He is a man who thinks independently. He does not always agree with the administration. He does not always agree with all groups in the Democratic Party."

Then he added with a grin, "Just as I do not," and the crowd laughed.

He also praised State Treasurer Robert Straub, the Democratic candidate for governor, as "a man who will give Oregon some leadership."

Then he turned to the message he has given to many college audiences. "You have a responsibility to those who suffer in this country and all around the world," he told them.

People Can Change

"If there is one thing I learned as attorney general of the United States it is that one person with an idea, a thought, a commitment can make things better," he added.

When he was done with those brief remarks he got standing ovation number three.

A pretty blond with a turned-up nose asked, "Since you disagree with Mr. Duncan on the war, but you support him anyway, does that mean that you consider your political affiliation more important than your principles?"

Kennedy answered in a series of short, rapid-fire sentences. "I have never suggested to Mr. Duncan that he change his position. He has never suggested to me that I change mine. I respect him for what he has done on education, on Medicare and on many other issues. I respect his view. I think he respects mine. I sup-

port him for the Senate of the United States."

"What are your political ambitions the next six years?" someone else asked.

"Just to be a good United States Senator," Kennedy grinned back impishly and got a round of laughter.

Viet Nam

Then somebody asked him to detail how he felt on Viet Nam. At that point a little girl in a front row screamed.

"That's how I feel," he grinned to more laughter.

Then he got serious.

He called for more pacification efforts in Viet Nam, more effort at making the Vietnamese feel it is their war and not the United States', more emphasis on peaceful negotiations, and added that he has serious reservations from a military point of view about bombing North Viet Nam.

He added that the Viet Cong should be represented at the negotiating tables, "which is where I suppose I disagree with the present administration. (Senator Kennedy apparently hadn't heard of an earlier Oregon visitor, Vice President Hubert Humphrey, who said at the University that the U.S. is willing to have the Viet Cong at the conference table.)"

He got one of the biggest rounds of applause, when he answered a

question by saying, "If somebody attacks my country and the only thing I can do to save it was to fight, I will do what was necessary to save my country."

Somebody else asked about the 18-year-old vote. "I think it's terrific," Kennedy said in what was almost a boyish giggle, adding a reference to his popularity for youth, "I think I'll campaign in my next election to lower it to about 12."

Answers Questions

Then Kennedy turned questioner. Calling for raised hands on a number of issues, he found that most of the people in the room:

● Favored the present policy of the administration in Viet Nam, but with reservation.

● Thought the draft was unfair but college deferments were all right and a lottery system was best of all.

● Favored admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

Then he left in the midst of hands pressing up to shake his hand and children crowding around for autographs.

His final words were a quote from George Bernard Shaw: "Some look at what is and say 'why?' I look at what might be and say 'why not?'"

This is Russ Kennedy of Balboa Island, California, on an in-port field trip as a student aboard Chapman College's floating campus.

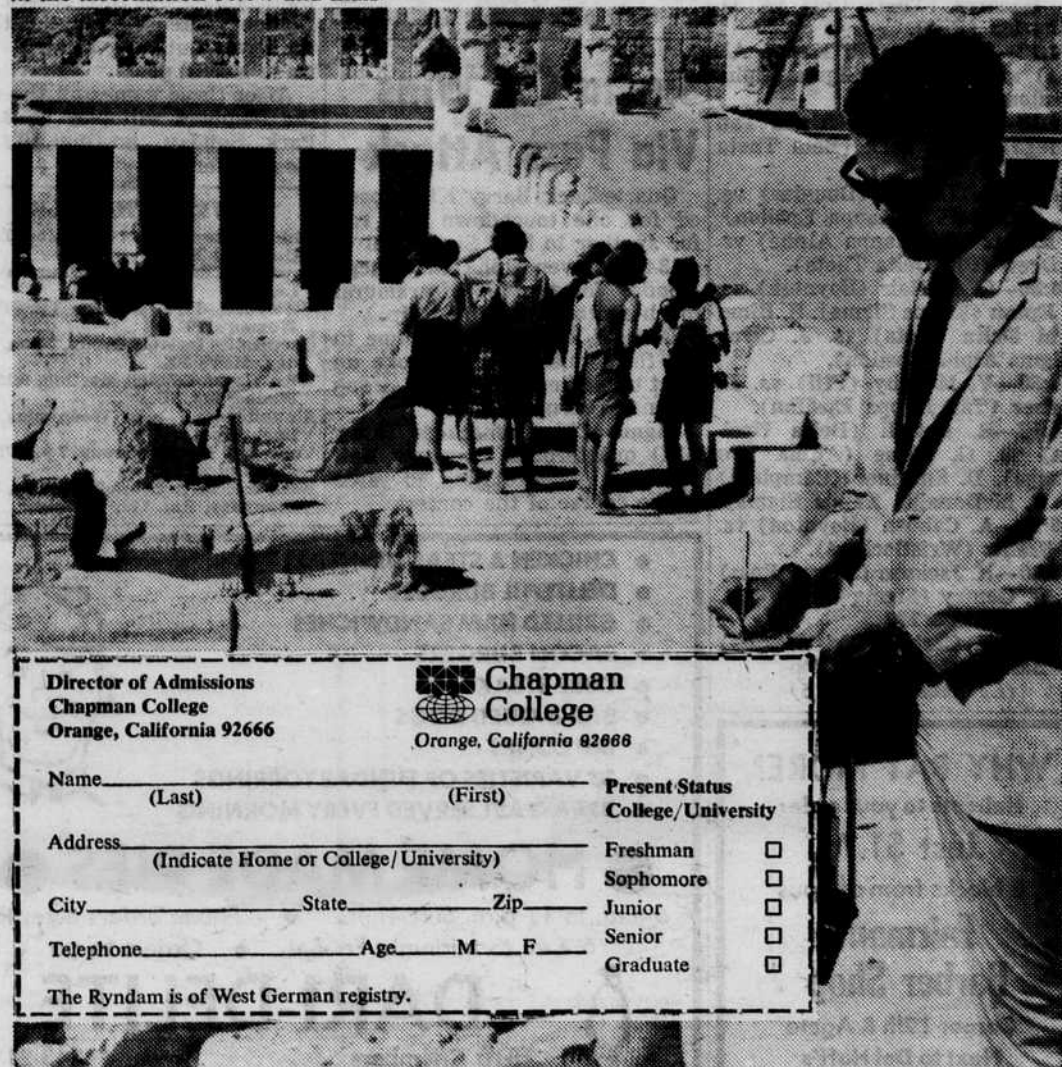
