Disappointment Runs High

Coaches Norm Chapman and Len Casanova this week had defeats to speak about, while scout Bruce Snyder gave an awesome report on the Idaho Vandals.

The scene was the weekly meeting of the Oregon Club at the Eugene Hotel.

Norm Chapman's Ducklings sort of "set the stage" Friday afternoon by fumbling on the seven yard line to set up the OSU Rooks' field goal with 30 seconds left. The Rooks won, 3-0.

The following day, the Ducks fell at the hands of the Washington Huskies, when Mike Barnes was hit on the three and fumbled, giving the Huskies an eventual touchdown and the winning margin.

"We didn't play well; I don't think we were ready, and that is my fault," said Chapman. "I'm to blame."

Chapman felt that quarterback

Tom Blanchard played a good game, "He threw the ball well."

Chapman also praised his backs: "They averaged close to four yards a carry. Andy Maurer looked pretty good carrying that ball."

Penalties Hurt

The Duckling mentor bemoaned the fact that his charges were hampered by penalties and dropped passes, which stopped drives. Defensively, Cam Sinclair was

singled out for his outstanding play.

Overall, Chapman noted that it was a "game of mistakes."

"We won't lose for two weeks," Chapman finished. He seemed pretty confident, and why not? The Ducklings don't play until Nov. 12 in Seattle when they meet the Husky Pups.

Although his Ducks lost, head Coach Len Casanova did not feel that his team had played a bad

ballgame.

"Defensively we played real good ball," Cas noted. He singled out Jimmy Smith, the defensive halfback who "sticks like glue" to the best receiver the opponents have to offer.

"Jim made one of the finest plays in a long while, to stop the Husky drive before their field goal," praised Cas.

Cas Disappointed

Cas mentioned disappointment, "We were disappointed, like any time we lose, but I'm terrifically disappointed when we lose to Washington."

He praised the Huskies, "They were a good solid club. Their player loses didn't hurt; it sort of helped in a way."

Cas also felt that his offense didn't move well, but contributed this to the Huskies fine punting. "Their kicking hurt us more than anything. We couldn't get in good position to use our entire offense."

Asked why he inserted Brundage in the waning moments of the game, Cas explained, "Mike is a fine passer in the middle and on sideline patterns. He is best against the prevent defense, which was set up, with his short passes. He is one of the best around in this situation."

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'Confident' Bombers Bombed by Seattle

SEATTLE, Washington (Special)—A confident Eugene Bombers eleven had hopes of a PFL championship in its first year of action, when it traveled to Seattle last weekend.

Their hopes were virtually extinguished Sunday, however, when they were dealt a 30-7 loss by the league-leading Ramblers.

According to Bomber coach Jack Crabtree, it was basically inexperience that cost his team the game. He said mistakes were made "not only by the ballplayers but by the coaches."

Crabtree still feels Eugene is "as good a team as Seattle." In previous games, he noted, the Bombers have shown more poise.

"We sure didn't show it Sunday, though," he said, and "I can't really offer much explanation for it."

Among others, Crabtree singled out halfback Bob Officer, a South Eugene graduate, and linebacker Tim Casey, a former Oregon star, for their play against Seattle. He

said Casey "always gives an outstanding performance."

Officer played a key role in Eugene's second quarter touchdown drive, after defensive back Tim Osmer intercepted a Rambler aerial and returned it to the Seattle 46.

Right half Hugh Oldham made gains of seven and six yards after which Roger Daniels connected with split end Ray Palm on the 27.

A play later, Daniels handed off to Officer, who threw to the right to Paul Burleson. The flanker stepped into the end zone to put Eugene on the scoreboard.

Seattle dominated most of the game, scoring just after the opening kickoff. Two ex-Ducks—Larry Hill on offense and Ray Johnson on defense—aided the Ramblers' efforts.

Defensive back John Ripper briefly halted a Seattle TD drive in the fourth quarter, when he picked off a Rambler aerial on his own four-yard line.

The next play, however, a Daniels pass was intercepted. The Bomber defense held Seattle at the two, but the kicking team made a field goal.

After three games on the road, the Bombers will play at Bethel Park Sunday, hosting the Edmonds Warriors.

Sigma Chi Wins Via Pass Attack

Quarterback Barry Klein passed for one touchdown and ran for another to lead Sigma Chi to a 13-0 win over Alpha Tau Omega Monday for the 1966 intramural touch football championship.

Both of Klein's scores came in the third quarter—and broke up what until then had been a strong defensive struggle.
