Boycott SU Barbershop

I hope to use all the glandular intellectualism that is employed by the ban-the-bomb — end-the-draft — withdraw-from-Viet Nam people, though I can't hope to compete with their general faulty logic, disregard of reality, and stupidity.

My issue: Why must students pay the outrageous price of

\$2.25 for a haircut in their own Student Union? Could it be that the Student Union has been usurped from the students by outside unions?

Since the rather sad financial situation of the typical student is recognized throughout the country by reduced rates, it seems proper that our own union could recognize the same situation.

Two bucks a whack should be the most that a student should ever have to pay; many barbershops seem to run profitably at \$1.50 per haircut.

If a 10 per cent reduction in price, say to \$2, resulted in 10 per cent more haircuts on this campus (and note that I don't suggest it will), I'd say we'd all reap the benefits many times over.

My proposal: When a union (the students') feel it's being victimized by management (the Barbers Union?), they strike. So I propose a boycott of the SU barbershop as long as they continue to exploit us.

Let's start the boycott in a week; we want to give them plenty of time to negotiate, work out reduced prices, rebates, lower prices during slack time, or whatever is needed to give the student a better break.

Men, until we get our break get your haircuts elsewhere, at whatever price you have to pay; it can't hardly be worse than SU prices.
