'Healthy' Ducks Drill, Scrimmage

Remember when a football game with the University of Washington meant medical problems for the rest of the year? Apparently, that tradition has ended.

Only two Ducks failed to suit up for Tuesday's football practice—and that, according to the Oregon coaches, is unusual for so few days after an Oregon-Washington game. Furthermore,

both of those two — offensive guard Ross Carter and tackle Roger Stalhut—are expected to be back in pads today.

Carter came up with a temporary illness Tuesday while Stalhut developed a late back muscle problem from the game Saturday. The other members of the team either drilled hard on offense or defense in Tuesday's drill—and then everybody parti-

cipated in a scrimmage session near the end.

The defense worked against the outside run plays Idaho will likely send All-America fullback Ray McDonald on, in addition to concentrating on stopping the Vandal's interior line smashes.

Offensively, the Ducks worked on their overall attack.

And Oregon's first unit defensive beat the first unit offense 6-4

in the scrimmage during the last half of the drill.

In a later scrimmage, Oregon's freshman offense went against the second unit defense in a non-scoring battle.

The team — in five separate units—watched films of various Idaho games later Tuesday night.

UO 3rd in PAC Defense

Remember how at the beginning of football season Oregon's defense was tabbed as one of the Ducks' weakest points?

Thanks to the efforts of players such as George Dames, Jeff MacRae, Cam Molter, Ken Klein, Jim Smith, Tim Temple, and Omri Hildreth, just to name a few, that concept has now been changed.

And this week's Pacific Athletic Conference six-game statistics show it.

For the third week in a row Oregon holds down the number three spot in total defense behind the conference's two Rose Bowl contenders, USC and UCLA.

In the Ducks' two wins this season, the defense has heroically held on to an early lead, and they might have done it again last Saturday against Washington if it hadn't been for an Oregon fumble on the three-yard line which set up the winning touchdown.

After giving up 55 points in three opening defeats the Duck defense has stiffened and has allowed only two touchdowns in the last three games.

Oregon wingback Scott Cress joined the conference's top ten receivers with his performance against Washington. Cress caught OSU's Bobby Grim and passed Washington's Dave Williams and Paul Cope as well as WSU's McWashington, to move up to eighth place.

The only new leaders in the conference stats are UCLA's Mel Farr and OSU's Pete Pifer. Farr took over the scoring lead from teammate Gary Beban and Pifer passed Washington's Don Moore, who was suspended, for the top rushing spot.
