John Dick, another candidate for senator-at-large, brought up the problem of what would happen to freshmen under this plan.

For example, a student could choose to take English composition on a pass-no-pass basis. "Would he work as hard here as in his graded classes," Dick asked, "or would he just slough off?"

Nancy Holmes, women's co-op representative, said that if a student came from a high school that didn't give him a good writing background, using this option the student would enable him to survive.

The professor she continued, could just give him a no-pass (which is not recorded on the transcript) and the student would take the course over again.

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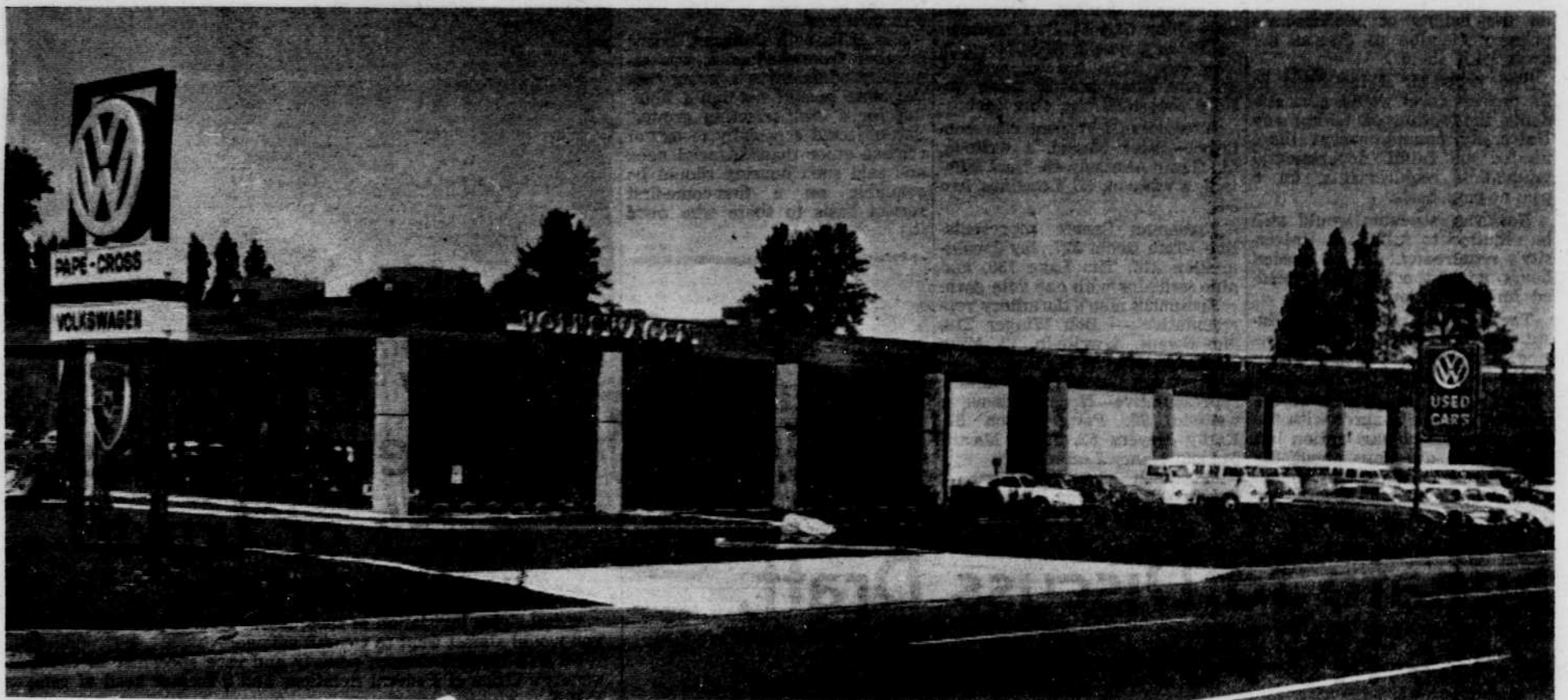


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
