

## British Architect Lectures Today

British architect, John Donat, who has done architectural free lance photography, will give a public lecture at 8 p.m. today in room 108 Lawrence Hall.

Donat is visiting the University in connection with the invitational conference on "Oregon Communities: Visual Quality and Economic Growth," October 27-29 at the Village Green in Cottage Grove. He will also spend some time meeting with students.

His topic tonight will be "The Camera Always Lies." He will discuss objective and subjective visual reporting of architecture with a plea to place architecture in its environment.

Donat is an associate of the Royal Institute of British Architects and is editor of World Architecture Four.

## High School IRL To Discuss UN

About 350 students from 75 Oregon high schools will meet at the University Saturday for the fall assembly of the Oregon High School International Relations League.

"The United Nations: How it Functions in a Changing World" is this year's study topic for the IRL. The students will consider what the U.N. should or could do to bring an end to the Viet Nam war, as well as it could do to bring about peace on Cyprus and resolve the Kashmir and Arab-Israeli disputes.

Joint sponsors of the assembly are the University's Institute of International Studies and Overseas Administration and the Oregon Education Association.

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## Oregon Assembly Convenes at OCE

"How Does Mass Media Affect Student Involvement in Politics?" is the topic of this year's first Oregon Assembly, a University sponsored program designed to give insight into controversial topics.

Galen R. Rarick, associate professor of journalism and director of communications research at the University will be the keynote speaker when the group convenes at the Student Center of Oregon College of Education in Monmouth Saturday.

Registration will be at 11 a.m. followed by a luncheon. Rarick will speak at 12:45 p.m. Following his speech, two discussions will focus on controversial questions regarding the topic in an effort to stimulate discussion.

Secondly, the rankings make grading difficult for teachers who realize their decisions have military consequences.

Finally, he said that the draft situation forces the student to go to poorer universities and take easier courses to get higher grades.

Marv Feuerberg, supporting Aberle, said that if Aberle's proposal is passed, it would "hit the newspapers which would reveal a schism between the Selective Service Department and the University."

Dave McCloskey commented that the role of the University is "not to be a middleman and not to be a babysitter for the students, but to allow the students to make their own decisions."

There were more senators than usual at the meeting, but eight still failed to show up. Those absent were Alan Carter, Ron Greenman, Gene Hazel, Rich Jernstedt, Al Miller, Sparky Petre, Chuck Pruitt, and John Taylor.

## Dry Pledge Rule Dropped From Sorority Constitution

The dry pledge rule has been stricken from the Panhellenic constitution according to Mary Sievers, president of Panhellenic Wednesday night at the general Panhellenic meeting.

There were several reasons for the move to remove the dry pledge rule from the constitution, according to Miss Sievers.

First, the ruling is redundant with the Oregon state law which states that no one under 21 shall drink alcoholic beverages.

Secondly, Panhellenic felt that

by removing the dry pledge ruling state law will be strengthened. Girls living in the houses will not be so tempted to drink after they are initiated members.

Third, the dry pledge rule was not enforceable.

And fourth, many people, both Greeks and independents, said they felt that the dry pledge rule was "ridiculous."

Miss Sievers said that although the dry pledge rule has been lifted the pledges in the houses on campus will still be warned of the state law prohibiting drinking for those under 21.

In other business Wednesday, Panhellenic discussed the possibility of bringing up a bill for later closing hours for all campus living organizations before the Student Conduct Committee. The matter will be discussed at the Sorority Presidents' Council next week.

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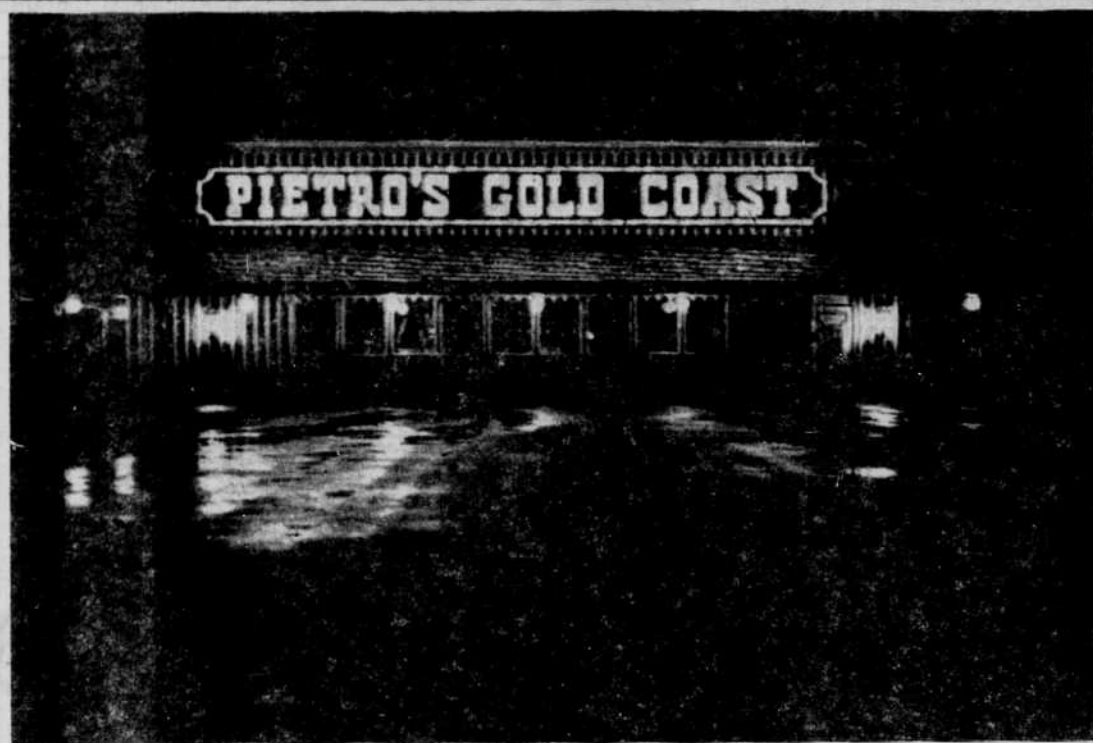
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
