

Webfoots Fly to McDonald's Farm

Head Coach Len Casanova, his coaching staff, and squad will depart at 1 p.m. today for a Saturday date in Boise, Idaho with the Idaho Vandals.

Cas reports he will take 44 players, but will be without the services of fullback Arian Elms and possibly wingback Scott Cress.

Cress sustained a badly sprained ankle early in the week and his condition is still uncertain.

Oregon Sports Information Director Hal Childs called Cas Thursday morning and reported that the weather was warm and quite good. However, Childs also said there was a 20 per cent chance of rain for Saturday and that a high school game is to be played tonight on the same field.

Stop McDonald

Cas reports that his main concern this week is finding a way to stop All-American Ray McDonald, the tailback, and fullback Butch Slaughter.

McDonald at 6-5, 248, is quite a formidable runner once he reaches full speed. He also has bruising power into the line and breaks many tackles.

Slaughter is 5-9, 190 and a two year letterman. He averaged 4.3 yards per carry in 1965 and like McDonald is a tough, hard runner with good speed.

Asked if he feared the Vandals' size, Cas replied with a very affirmative, "I sure do."

"They're not slow either," added Cas. He mentioned that in the Idaho-WSU game a Cougar back got loose for a long run and a lineman some ten yards behind from the start actually gained ground on the fleeing halfback.

Vandals Dominated WSU

"They have had some disappointing games; they should have won last week," related Cas. The Vandals dominated their WSU game, the statistics, and the ball, but came out on the short end of a 14-7 score. The Cougars scored late in the game to win.

"They'll be hungry for a win, but we are too," Cas added.

Cas also mentioned the fact that the Vandals have a solid team overall but do lack a little bit in depth. He said the Vandals are a lot bigger than Air Force, but he is not sure about their quickness.

Looking at some of the other Vandal

personnel, and 15 of the 22 starters are lettermen. Cas noted quarterback John Foruria as plenty dangerous.

"We have a lot of respect for him; he is a good runner, and has been a good passer."

Foruria didn't play against the Ducks last year in Oregon's Homecoming game because he was sidelined with a punctured lung suffered against OSU. The 6-2, 195 pound, two-year letterman gained 408 yards total offense last year, completing 24 passes for 260 yards, in four games.

Foruria is an erratic passer and has completed less than 35 per cent of his tosses this year but has averaged close to 14 yards a completion.

Murrell, Miller Ends

His main targets include Manny Murrell, a speedster from Long Beach, and Ray Miller a 245 pound, 6-5 tight end. Although each has good moves and fine speed the Vandals are not noted for their air attack.

Oregon's starting backfield is basically the same as last week, with Mike Barnes at quarterback, Kent Grote at fullback, Steve Jones at tailback, and wingback

Roger Smith if Cress is unable to go.

The Duck line will probably remain unchanged except for Roger Stallhut who is still a little stiff from a back problem.

Booters Slate Active Weekend

Oregon's Mallard soccer team hosts Reed College tomorrow at 2 p.m. on the men's P.E. field. The Mallards, 1-1, are slightly favored over the Reed team, 0-2, which lost 12-1 to Oregon's Duck squad last week.

The Mallards downed the Eugene Bavarians amateur team 5-2 Wednesday night in an exhibition contest believed to be the first night soccer game ever in Oregon.

Saturday's Oregon Intercollegiate Soccer Association match will follow a preliminary game between Oregon's JV team and Bishop Dagwell Hall, a private Portland high school.

Oregon's Duck team, currently leading OISA standings, will meet Amsterdam of the Portland amateur league Sunday.
