

Military Professor Cited for Heroism

Captain Karl L. Beach, assistant professor of military science at the University, has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal for valor in service in the Republic of Viet Nam.

The award was presented by Colonel Embert A. Fossum, professor of military science at the University, in a ceremony on the campus last Friday.

Beach was cited for heroism on February 9, 1966, while serving as a rifle platoon leader with Co. A, 2d Battalion, 502 Airborne Infantry, 101st Airborne Division, in Viet Nam.

Beach has previously received the Combat Infantryman's Badge, the Bronze Star Medal, the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnamese Service Medal, and

the Vietnamese Campaign Medal.

A 1933 graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, Beach served in Viet Nam from May, 1965 through May, 1966. He was assigned to the military department at the University in July, 1966.

and didn't receive credit.

The General Education Experiment Program (GEEP) was the result of these two seminars.

GEEP took the place of the group's regular General Education or humanities course given at SF State. It was planned and run by the freshmen, two sophomores and three professors.

The third seminar was composed of students interested in community organizing and was led by a community organizer working within the city.

Excited People Built It

According to Karen Duncan, one of the GEEP alumni and member of the staff of the EC, "It's important to understand that the Experimental College as an institution was not built essentially by that original group of people who began the planning."

"It was built by the people who became excited about taking responsibility for their own education and who decided to act on that excitement by organizing and/or attending EC classes in the spring semester," she said.

Last spring the EC consisted of 22 seminars organized almost entirely by students. One of the classes was a "no-name seminar" with social critic Paul Goodman whom the EC hired to come to State for a term.

The budget of the Experimental Colleges comes out of the Associated Students budget, with which the EC is associated.

Not Over Night

The idea for an Experimental College didn't spring up over night. "It's been one development in the four or five year long process to make State truly an institution of higher learning instead of a giant IBM factory," Miss Duncan said.

One of these was the "Philosophy Statement" on free speech and student freedom issued as a College policy in the fall of 1961.

Another was student representation on the major-policy-making boards of the college, including those which operate the bookstore and the dining facilities.

The third was the grants of student seats with voting privileges on the Academic Senate and many of its committees.

Campus YR's Set Campaign Meeting
