Ducks Get 28 ...

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Trovato as the regulars got a rest.

The Ducks kicked off, gave McDonald 16 yards in two carries, and after a couple of futile Foruria passes, recovered his fumble on the Idaho 40 with Cunningham getting the ball.

Welch got 15, then three, but penalties, messed up plays and other mistakes slowed them before an Idaho holding penalty and an 11 yard gain by Barnes put the ball on the enemy 11. Three plays later a fumbled pitch to Jones lost four and possession, on fourth down.

The Ducks held on downs, the Vandals punted and then it happened.

The series started with a routine two yard line smash by wingback Smith. Then Welch unloaded his thundering romp which was led by Steve Jones and the right side of the Duck line.

Brundage made another point after and the Ducks were good at 14-0.

Reserve Vandal quarterback Bob Garman returned the ensuing kickoff to the 28 where McDonald fumbled on the first play and Foksett recovered for the Ducks.

In five plays the Ducks went 30 yards. It didn't start prosperously, though. Barnes lost 14 with a bad pitch to Jones who had to fall on the ball.

Barnes missed again before finding Welch all alone for a 31 yard completion to the 13.

Secondary Receiver

Claxton reported he was the secondary receiver on the play. "Heron was the primary target, and I just slipped out in the flat, caught the ball and ran to the sidelines, ran out of room and went up field," he said.

Fullback Kent Grote went the last 13 yards on a fullback smash, carrying tacklers with him into the end zone.

Barnes noted that the game plan called for "passing on the defensive halfback and safety, with the split end running and inside hook." This left the other safety deep on the other side of the field and no one on Heron or Bunker.

The Ducks' final touchdown came with quarterback Tom Trovato and the second offensive unit at the helm.

The drive was set up when Tim Temple intercepted his second pass of the game.

From the Oregon 20, Trovato's big plays included a 13 yard toss to Bunker, and a 15 yard bullet to Schuler. The rest was ground-out, with Buller netting 22, Grote 12, and Schuler 12, including the last couple of yards.

The PAT by Brundage was good and the Ducks had a comfortable 28-0 lead and their third win of the campaign.

Idaho finally got on the board with Garman leading the attack, the final nine yards being covered

on a pass from Garman to McDonald.

The final statistics showed the Ducks to be very much in command. They led in first downs, 26 to 21, total offense, 480 to 355, and completed 13 of 28 passes for 193 yards.

A smiling Cas seemed very pleased with his 15th win in 15 tries against the Vandals.

He singled out Claxton for his fine rushing and Steve Jones for his excellent blocking.

Cas felt his defense "wasn't as sharp as it should have been," but was happy to contain McDonald as well as they did.

Idaho coach Steve Musseau spoke briefly in the morgue silence of his dressing room saying, "We shouldn't have lost, I didn't expect them to score. They got 28 we weren't expecting."
