

SWINE Plans Cube Party, Bigot Week, Magazine Sale

SWINE, a political satire organization, revealed plans in its meeting Friday for a sugar cube party sometime after Thanksgiving.

The Students Wildly Indignant about Nearly Everything, based on Al Capp's cartoon figures, refused to divulge further details about their acid party, but plan to publish a statement after the event.

Sub-sub editor of SWINE publications Walter J. Wentz, who conducted the meeting, offered his apartment for the SWINE party. "It's a regular pigpen, anyway," he said.

Wentz stated further the party would be a good way to get "revenge" on his fraternity neighbors who "throw beer bottles through my windows. We can throw sugar cubes through their windows," he said.

It was moved and passed to invite the Emerald reporter to their sugar cube party, and some mention was made to bribe the reporter with a free SWINE membership.

Although not stated in so many words, the reporter understands the bribe is to not reveal any names of the party's participants to any district attorneys.

Another SWINE plan is to proclaim a Bigot Week, designed to broaden hate horizons. The Bigot Week proposal will be published in the Emerald later this week.

Two magazines will be released soon, announced Wentz, who hopes to move from Sub-sub editor to Sub-assistant editor in the next coup.

"Opinion," a leftist magazine, will be available "in about a week." The cover will have a picture of "Brigitte Bardot," with the following statement by Amos P. Breadsacker: "Brigitte Bardot has warts. She is fat, ugly, and utterly disgusting!"

"Tame, the weakly magazine," will be released in December. Cynic Breadsacker also figures prominently in this rightist magazine.

Wentz, who has been invited to appear on "At Random" at 7 p.m. Wednesday on PL-3, looks on the magazines as typical SWINE progress. "Last year we only had four-page, front and back, newspapers. This year we've got three-page, front and back, magazines," he said.

The magazines create a financial problem, however. Last year the newspapers paid for themselves through sales. This year, with a treasury of \$16.50, the magazine can be paid for ahead of time. Wentz fears, therefore, sales might create a surplus of cash, which would be "terribly capitalistic."

As the radical middle, SWINE cannot allow such a problem to exist. Their solution will be to "burn all profits on a beach bash at the end of the year, and start anew like a Phoenix."

Although SWINE has 50 members, making it one of the largest groups at the University, they are looking for more—especially leftists.

"We need leftists, so we can get a good slam at the far right," said Wentz. "The trouble is," he continued, "leftists don't have a sense of humor, and do have a persecution complex." SWINE fears it has already "broken the spirit of SDS (Students for a Democratic Society)."

Aberle Proposal Rejected by IFC

At a recent meeting, the Inter-Fraternity Council voted 20 to 1 to reject the last three proposals put forth by anthropology professor David Aberle in his resolution on University Selective Service relations designed to separate the University from the operations of the Selective Service Administration.

Aberle, who attended the meeting, presented his four-point proposal during the pre-vote discussion. Part one of his proposal that concern the University withholding GPA ratings from the draft was not voted on due to the fact that it is already a University policy.

In other business of the meeting, it was announced that the IFC sponsored College Bowl will open its new season this week on PL-3. The SAEs are teamed with McClure to compete against Chi Omega and Ganoe Hall.

A proposal made at the last IFC meeting concerning fraternity men taking active part in donating blood to the Eugene Blood Bank will be officially put into effect this week.

Nurses from the Lane County Health Department will be visiting the individual fraternities taking members' blood types. Greeks have agreed to donate blood at any time to the blood bank.

Soc Prof Shot While Hunting

Joel Berreman, a professor of sociology, accidentally shot himself in the left foot while hunting Saturday on the mudflats near Florence.

According to his wife, Berreman had to crawl to the rowboat, row to shore, and crawl to the car on his hands and knees.

"He was quite some distance away and there weren't any people around to help . . . until he got to the car," Mrs. Berreman said.

A nurse from the Eugene Clinic told the Emerald that he was suffering from a "pretty nasty gunshot wound. The fact that it was a buckshot wound and the wound filled with debris while he was crawling to the car made matters worse."

Conference to Deal With Stock Market

Leading authorities in finance and the stock market will discuss timing and selection of security purchases at a one-day conference to be held by the University Wednesday.

Representatives of well-known brokerage firms and educators in finance and securities will examine the selection and timing of security purchases, with special emphasis on the next bull market from the technical viewpoint and from the fundamental viewpoint.

Consideration will be given to economic indicators of value in the timing of purchases, preservation of capital in bear markets, and the effect of business cycle analysis and government policy.

The conference will be held at the Eugene Hotel, beginning at 3:30 p.m.

Registration will open at 3 p.m. in the hotel. The registration fee of \$20 includes dinner and a social hour. The fee, payable to the University, should be sent to G. Winston Sturgen, director of conference, School of Business Administration, at the University.

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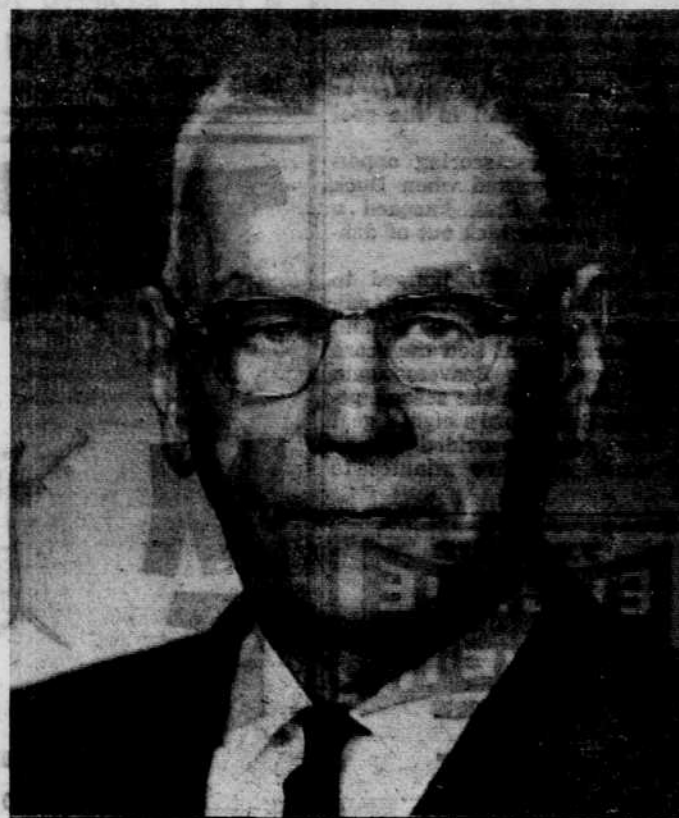
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
