

'Blockbuster' Scheduled Friday

Society Plans Series

The first program of underground films, characterized by their expressiveness, their experimental nature, and their sometimes unusual subject matter, will be presented Friday night by the University's Film Society.

The eight programs in the underground series will be offered at 8 p.m. in 150 Science through December 2, and January 6 through January 27.

Friday night's schedule, en-

titled "Blockbusters," includes several of these films which have created considerable excitement: "Scorpio Rising" and "Scarface and Aphrodite."

They are offered in addition to the regular programs of the Film Society, and are open only to season ticket holders. Season tickets may still be obtained in the Film Society at \$2 for five admissions, and \$6 for 16 admissions.

Possibilities Enormous

Underground films have been around for years since artists first realized that the film medium possessed enormous possibilities never explored by the mass movie makers.

This particular series is intended to show the different faces of underground films, as well as the best of these motion pictures. It was arranged by film critic Sheldon Renan, author of a forthcoming book on underground films.

"Our Founding Fathers," the November 11 program, will feature the first underground films, including those by such surrealists as Salvador Dali.

Poetic Treatment

The November 18 program deals with the poetic treatment of reality. It is billed as "Precisions and Patterns" and includes such films as "Lot in Sodom," directed by atson and Webber, and "Thantopsis."

"The Underground Looks at

Hollywood," a series of commentaries on Hollywood movie-making, will feature "Life and Death of a Hollywood Extra" and "Sins of the Fleshapoids," on December 2.

Films exposing the film-maker's senses of reality—"Grainy Statements of Life and Death"—will be the January 6 program.

Psychedelics Featured

Psychedelics—focusing on hallucinatory experiences—will be represented in this series on January 13. Some of the psychedelic films will center on the hallucinatory, or consciousness-expanding effects of the cinema itself, while others will deal with some aspects of the psychedelic experience.

Underground humor, including the film "Oh Dem Watermelons," will be featured on January 20.

"How Far Out Can You Get?" is the title of the final program on January 27, which will include works produced from such an entirely different point of view that they would probably not be shown in an ordinary movie theatre.

The January 27 program ends with a half-hour film by Tony Conrad which explores the effect of light patterns on the visual machinery of the eye. Because this film will cause photogenic epilepsy in approximately one out of every 30,000 people, persons inclined to photogenic or migraine should thus not see it.

University Wins Speech Honors

The University, for the second consecutive year, walked off with the sweepstakes trophy at the Centralia College speech tournament in Centralia, Washington, this weekend. The University chalked up twice as many points as the nearest competitor (the University of Washington).

The University's debate team of Rebecca Nobles, and Starla Banta, won first place in women's Oxford-style debate with a record of six wins and no losses.

In Lincoln-Douglas debate, Eric Blackledge was awarded the first place trophy in the men's division, and Roxanne Merrell and Ginger Nelson tied with each other for third place in the women's division.

Three of the four finalists in women's extemporaneous speaking were University coeds—Susan Tungate, first; Miss Banta, third; and Miss Nobles, fourth.

Miss Nobles took home the first place trophy in women's impromptu speaking, in which Miss Tungate placed second and Miss Banta third.

Edmund Davis and James Green won second and third places respectively, in men's impromptu speaking.

The first two places in men's oratory were won by University students. They were David Anderson first, and Robert Corso, second.

John Eades placed second in men's interpretive reading.

dark himself as to exactly what a particular phrase meant. Then the prime minister brought him a French copy of the constitution and happened to mention that this was the original draft.

Can't Think

The prime minister explained that "we can't think in any other language." Grant said the reason the French copy wasn't given to him before was that he wasn't trusted yet.

Much to the consternation of the U.S. embassy, Grant advised against habeas corpus because of an existing policy which allowed the government to arrest and jail anyone suspected of treasonable acts for an "indefinite period."

Grant also recommended that the new system of courts be run more independently of the government but President Diem then asked, "How do I know they will make the right decisions?"

Grant commented that the Vietnamese are trying too hard to create a completely new political system. They claim they "haven't borrowed anything from anybody," when in actuality there is very little they haven't borrowed from somewhere.

"I thought to myself," Grant said, "if the Vietnamese haven't borrowed anything from anybody and aren't about to start, then there isn't a whole lot I can do."

Deadline to File For Degree Set

The list of degree candidates for fall graduation is being compiled by the Registrar. Deadline for filing for a fall term degree is Friday. This date will be enforced in order to complete checking and printing of the list.

All work must be completed and transcripts from other schools filed not later than December 16. Any student who applied previously and did not receive a degree must re-apply. If the above deadlines are not met, the student must re-apply at a future date.

Pakistani's Visit Concludes Today

A government official from East Pakistan, Musa Ahmad, arrived in Eugene Friday to visit the University's Bureau of Municipal Research and Service and to meet with local Eugene officials.

Ahmad, secretary of the Department of Basic Democracies and Local Government in East Pakistan, is on the last leg of a tour of the United States to examine current work in local government, training, planning and research.

He is expected to leave Eugene today for San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Honolulu.

Panel on Drugs To Draw Experts

Four experts on drug use and its effects will participate in a panel discussion at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the Student Union Ballroom.

Elton McCawley, professor of pharmacology; Dr. Joseph Trainer, director of health services; Dr. Norman David, chairman of the pharmacology department; and Dr. Paul Blachly, assistant professor of psychiatry, all faculty members of the University of Oregon Medical School will participate in the panel discussion.

Dr. W. A. Brooksby of the University health service will moderate the discussion.

This panel will be the second of a series of educational programs on drugs and alcohol throughout the school year, sponsored by the SU Forum Committee and the Office of Student Affairs.

The four speakers will all present a short talk dealing with different aspects of drug use. McCawley will talk about marijuana, and Dr. David will consider barbiturates and benzedrine. Dr. Trainer will discuss drug use by college students and how drug use affects their performance as students. Dr. Blachly, formerly associated with the federal government's hospital in Lexington, Kentucky, for narcotic addicts, will draw upon his experiences there during his presentation.

After the discussion, they will answer questions from the audience. The four men have said that they do not wish to discuss the legal aspects of drug use during their visit.

The visitors will also be available for informal discussions with interested students and faculty members Wednesday evening in Sweetser Hall.

The residents of Sweetser will host the men for dinner and a discussion afterwards. The discussion, starting at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, will be held in the Sweetser Hall dining room.

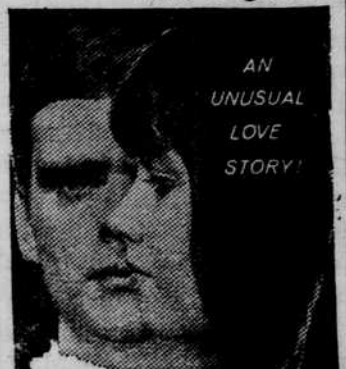
All interested persons are invited to attend the panel discussion and the informal discussion.

Transportation Expert to Speak

Transportation policies in the "Great Society" will be discussed Wednesday at the University by one of the nation's leading authorities on transportation, Roy J. Sampson, professor of transportation at Oregon.

Sampson's public Browsing Room lecture is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the SU.

He will discuss the economic and legal foundations of transportation policy, and then comment on such subjects as the new cabinet Department of Transportation and items of local interest concerning transportation.

Discussion leader for the Wednesday lecture-discussion will be Donald D. Thompson, associate professor of marketing and assistant dean of the Division of Graduate Studies of the School of Business Administration.
