Interesting Reactions

Henry Drummonds' decision to request reclassification by his Selective Service Board and in effect to volunteer for military service, just like any other citizen, has produced some interesting reactions.

The Eugene Register-Guard said it is not for him to decide who shall be deferred nor for him to say that education is less important than equal chance of military service. And a small number of law students have indicated that they regard Mr. Drummonds as a trouble-maker and a phony.

At least so interpret their singing of the tune of Onward Christian Soldiers with no manifest religious or other serious intent.

Having gained some knowledge of students, both when I was one and since commencing to teach, I am willing to take people pretty much at face value, including undergraduates and law students. Anyone who, unlike Mr. Drummonds, does not have his doubts about the prudence of our Viet Nam involvement, is short in memory of Indochinese history and caloused in his political sensitiveness.

Anyone who, unlike Mr. Drummonds, thinks that it is not for students to think independently and act independently fails to understand the individual responsibility of a free citizenship in a free country.

Such decisions and reactions recur. Socrates fought in the armed force of his beloved Athens and much later he accepted its lawful, immoral decision that he must die.

I take his actions at face value and think they were noble. Although not, I trust, of the same extreme degree, Mr. Drummonds' actions are of the same kind.

And I take the acts of that small segment of law students for what they indicate, too. Are they the same individuals who, overfull of law after their exams last spring, engaged in their uncivilized saturnalia so disturbing to the peace and dignity of the people of the state of Oregon?
