

Co-ed Pleads Guilty Of Hour Violation

A freshman girl was sanctioned to disciplinary probation for one term for falsifying information to the University in Student Court Tuesday.

The charge was that the defendant called her living organization saying she was at home, when in fact, she was not and didn't intend to be.

The closed hearing began in the last Court session Oct. 25, but was adjourned as there was question whether falsifying information to a living organization in sign-out procedure was the same thing as falsifying information to the University, a violation of section I.B.2.e. of the Student Conduct Code.

A committee, including counsel for the defense Jeremy Randolph III, third-year law student, and Greg Reed, student prosecutor, talked to several University officials, including Dean of Women Golda P. Wickham and President Arthur S. Flemming, about the matter.

Tuesday in Court the committee reported the opinions and interpretations resulting from the various consultations.

After more than two hours of deliberation the Court voted 4-1 that the offense was indeed a violation under the Code.

After this decision, the defendant pleaded guilty and the case was tried.

The Court decided that although the University has delegated certain authority to living organizations, the University does not give living organizations the responsibility to maintain them-

selves as separate entities from the University.

Reed pointed out that the sanction of one term of disciplinary probation is unusually light for this type of offense. There were "extenuating circumstances" in this case, however, he said, which mitigated the sanction.
