

Stanford's Beta Chi Drops Selective Member System

STANFORD (CPS)—In a surprise move, Beta Chi fraternity at Stanford University voted to abolish its selective system of choosing new members. Radically breaking from traditional procedure, the fraternity opened its doors to anyone connected with the University, including women, faculty members, graduate students and administrators.

On October 17, over three-quarters of the house's 55 members rejected selection procedures currently employed by all Stanford fraternities. Members instructed their executive committee to draw up plans allowing any interested member of the Stanford community to become a member of Beta Chi. Interest in the house's activities and payment of dues were the only stipulated prerequisites to membership.

PRESIDENT DISSATISFIED

The Interfraternity Council president said, "We welcome Beta Chi's move with open arms. We know they've done a lot of serious thinking about this."

Dick Williams, president of Beta Chi, expressed dissatisfaction with the Council. He said that he would stay in IFC for the quarter term only to see whether other member houses were sincere in their recently professed desire to renew emphasis on education among the campus' fraternities.

Williams said Beta Chi's move was in protest against the blackball system and exclusive selective living. Intellectual fraternity programs, he added, can be good enough to attract new members.

Fraternities, including Beta Chi, have traditionally been inward-oriented, Williams said, and the house's intention now is to become a greater part in the University community.

SYSTEM NOT THREATENED

Of the other 24 fraternity presidents at Stanford, 16 stated that Beta Chi's revised member selection policy would not be a threat to the fraternity system. They added, however, that their houses would not consider such a move in the near future.

Although some of the presidents admired the move, others criticized Beta Chi as being either too farsighted or too progressive. Several said that Beta Chi was no longer a real fraternity, but a dormitory with Greek letters.

Williams blamed fraternities' resistance to change on an overreliance on national fraternity leadership.

Beta Chi, formerly Beta Chi chapter of Sigma Nu fraternity, went local in 1962.

Governor's Arts Council To Hold Public Hearing

As a part of the "most searching examination of Oregon's art and humanities in the history of the state," the Governor's Planning Council on the Arts and Humanities will hold public hearings Tuesday in Eugene.

The hearings will be held at 3 and 7:30 p.m. at the Eugene City Council Hall, 777 Pearl Street.

The Planning Council, organized last spring by Governor Mark Hatfield, is trying to develop a permanent state agency in the field of the arts and humanities, develop a draft statute and a program for the proposed Oregon Arts Humanities Commission.

According to Jarrod Kieffer, vice-chairman of the council and an assistant to University President Arthur S. Flemming, the purpose of the nine public hearings is to "try and explain the program to citizens, representatives of civil and art organizations and a chance for them to react to the proposal and make suggestions."

Program to Aid Art

Kieffer said the "program's key thrust is to aid art at the community level."

The temporary body, he said, will ask the legislature for \$50,000, which will be matched by another \$50,000 of federal money.

"All this will go for programs but the amount doesn't permit us to subsidize new programs," he said.

"As I see it," he said, "the permanent agency could do a lot of needed work."

"It could act as a pin-pointer of aid. It might work with the communities and the organizations to

figure out what might put them on a better footing."

"It could bring advice and assistance . . . it's amazing how much is needed. It could encourage local co-operation; act as a clearing house for information. It could act as a focal point for alerting the communities about the availability of touring groups based inside and outside the state, and facilitate the arrangements for bringing these groups to places where they usually wouldn't go."

"Who knows? They might even give financial help," he concluded.

"Small grants to make things possible or to cover stubborn gaps."

"We could make greater use of Portland and Eugene symphonies," he said dreamily, "send them to Roseburg, for example, and three or four other communities in that area that would just love to have a symphony."

Concerts Possible

"They could give concerts in the schools and hold workshops."

"We might even spring loose some local money — not very much but enough to make things possible," Kieffer added, smiling wistfully.

"There's another thing the permanent body could do . . . it could speak as a state agency in the councils of government on the needs and interests of the arts, which aren't often represented now."

Work With Ideas

"The ideas now is to work with practical ideas that need to be done, but these ideas must be capable ideas that need to be done, but these ideas must be capable of being implemented

with very little money," Kieffer said.

"It's my personal hope," he continued, "that a certain percentage of the budget could be used to bring things into being."

"The council won't have much \$100,000 a year for ten years money to work with now, but that means \$1 million."

"For instance," he said, "eventually the state commission might make a number of small grants on aid to cover students during that transition period from getting out of school and into the world of the arts."

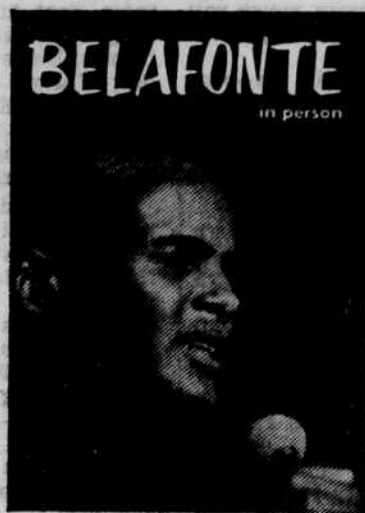
