Barnhart Gets Senate Position

Editor's Note: Due to severe space limitations in Friday's issue, the report of Thursday's Senate meeting was split into two parts. The first part covered the Senate's action on a bill formalizing their Student Union Board review procedure. This story covers the remainder of the meeting.

In other business Thursday, the Senate heard a report from Jerry Norton, chairman of the recently-formed Re-apportionment Committee, who outlined the two proposals which came out of the committee's meeting Thursday afternoon.

One proposal was to increase off-campus representatives by

nine, one fraternity representative, one sorority representative, and two representatives from the College Inn.

The other proposal was to recast the Senate into a bicameral body, with one house represented according to population, the other by class.

The committee has made no final stand on the matter, and Norton said they'd hold two more meetings to try to come up with one.

The Senate also elected men's upperclass dormitory representative Phil Barnhart as the new chairman of committees by a 3-to-1 margin. Barnhart replaces former senator-at-large Chuck Pruitt, who resigned from the Senate and the chairmanship recently.

The vocal roll call vote was 21 to 7 in favor of Barnhart, over his only opponent, three-year Senate veteran Mike Donahue.

The Senate was also presented with three notices of motion:

- From Norton's subcommittee one re-apportionment, concerning changes in the structure of the Senate.

- From Dave McCloskey, chairman of the Academic Affairs Committee, a motion concerning pass-nopass courses for undergraduates.

- From Mike Donahue, chairman of Governing Committee, a motion on closing hours.

Three Students Receive Injuries In Accidents

Three University students were injured in two separate traffic accidents over the weekend.

Janet O'Dell and Karen French escaped with minor injuries Saturday night when their car collided with a truck carrying three horses at the intersection of Seventh Avenue and Jefferson Street in Eugene. They were taken to Sacred Heart Hospital and later released to the University infirmary.

The driver of the truck escaped without injuries but was charged with violating a traffic signal, according to Eugene police.

In another accident on Saturday, Saw Chin Wong, a student from Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia was injured when he jumped from a moving car on West 20th Avenue near Willamette Street. The driver of the car, in which he was a passenger, was charged with driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor and for having faulty brakes, according to Eugene police.

Wong is listed in good condition with head injuries at Sacred Hospital.

Deadline Set For Applicants

Court Gives Students Disciplinary Probation

Five students were sanctioned to disciplinary probation for cheating on a Chemistry 107 quiz in separate cases in Student Court Friday.

The charge in all cases was that the defendants copied some calculations from another student's paper, violation of section I.B.2.a. of the Student Conduct Code.

The professor and his grading assistants had suspected cheating on previous quizzes, so for this quiz the figures provided were different on half the tests. The tests were passed out in alternating order.

Students Confess

Afterwards the professor called all students suspected of cheating into his office "to discuss their quiz papers." Most of the students admitted they had cheated, some even before they were asked if they had.

All but one student pleaded guilty in court.

In the first case, the defendant, a junior, was sanctioned to disciplinary probation until Decem-

ber 31, 1968. His counsel was Stewart Wilson, a third-year law student.

The second and third defendant, both freshmen, were sanctioned to disciplinary probation until September 1, 1967. Counsel in both cases was Duane Culbertson, a third-year law student.

Intent Found Fraudulent

In the next case a sophomore girl pleaded not guilty. She did admit she had copied, but counsel Chris Ledwidge, third year law student, argued her innocence on the grounds that she had confessed immediately of her own volition before her professor had even called her into his office.

The court decided, however, that she had turned in her paper with fraudulent intent, and sanctioned her to disciplinary probation until December 31, 1967.

The fifth defendant, a freshman, also defended by Ledwidge, was sanctioned to disciplinary probation until September 1, 1967.

Another hearing for the same charge was postponed since the defendant was not able to appear in person at that time.

Group Distributes Letter at PSC

A new newsletter, designed to offer opinions which are "alternative to the new left," is now being distributed on campus.

The letter, called Pense (a French word meaning "thought") is the publication of the Student Academic Freedom Forum (STAFF), a new group of what its local president, Gaines Smith, calls "enlightened conservatives."

The letter, printed by the STAFF chapter at Portland State College, is also being distributed by members on the PSC and Reed campuses.

Explaining the new organization, Smith said it calls itself "the New Right," but that it is not affiliated with the John Birch Society.

"We're not the 'Godmother-country-apple pie type of group. ... We consider the New Left to be intellectually bankrupt, and we're just stepping into the vacuum," he said.

Bishop Named Business Head

Wilbur Bishop, Jr. has been named business manager of the Emerald by the Student Publications Board.

Bishop has served as acting business manager since the beginning of the term because Louie Abramson, appointed business manager last spring, did not return to school.

One other candidate for the post, Thomas Roth, former business manager of the Oregon State Daily Barometer, withdrew.

The Publications Board also named Bob McCarl as one of the three editors of Next, the student literary magazine. He replaces Chris Dyer who also did

not return to the campus this fall.

Bishop appointed Caroline Pitman as advertising manager of the Emerald.

Emerald Editor Phil Semas has also announced several changes in the news staff. News Editor Larry Lange has been appointed associate editor, Assistant News Editor Mike Fancher has been promoted to news editor, and Jean Snider has been named assistant managing editor.

The Publications Board, which met Thursday night, also denied the request of Lambda Chi Alpha to publish a calendar because of possible conflict with Emerald advertising revenues.
