

Committee to Urge Building Sites

The Campus Planning Committee agreed in their special meeting Thursday to recommend to President Flemming that the site of the proposed building for Science III and the considered sites for future science buildings be accepted as included in the architects concept study.

Flemming will consider this recommendation and present it to the State Board of Higher Education in December. The State Board will consider the building for its 1967-68 biennium. Science III has a high priority rating on the board's budget at this time.

The site is west of Emerald

Hall on 13th Street. The proposed building of 81,500 square feet is based on a \$3,500,000 budget. Federal grants are to provide \$1 million of this. The rest will have to come from state funds if the State Board approves the construction.

Science III is planned as a biological-science building to consolidate the biology department. This building is the first one on the University priority list for proposed construction.

The architectural firm of Skidmore, Owings, and Merrill presented their concept studies of the site and also some very early plans to the Campus Planning Committee Thursday.

The committee approved the building basic study and authorized the architects to proceed with their preliminary drawings. The committee will review these drawings several times before final approval and recommendation to the President for the actual building.
