Student-Faculty Council Urges Library Committee

The Student-Faculty Council asked for a joint student-faculty committee to investigate complaints about the library and to consider a joint committee to

oversee library policy.

Though lacking a quorum at its meeting Tuesday, it went ahead to instruct its chairman, Robert Horn, professor of English, to move the committee's creation at the December faculty meeting.

The council's action was prompted by a list of proposals signed by about 40 graduate students. Included is a request that fines be levied on faculty members as well as students, that names of borrowers holding books needed by someone else be released and that students be placed on the library committee.

Future Joint Committee

William Block, spokesman for the petitioners, agreed to the motion. Envisioned is a future joint committee which would have the power to determine and review library policy.

Council members mentioned longer library hours and rules changes in the reserve book room as other goals to be sought.

A letter from Carl Hintz, University librarian, was read which answered several of the proposals on the list.

Hintz said books loaned to faculty members are subject to recall after 14 days and the library is trying to bill faculty members if they do not respond.

Hintz Disagrees

Hintz said he does not think borrowers' names should be released because it would allow harassment by others who wanted a book from them.

And he suggested that a student committee be set up, but said the complaints listed are not among the functions of the committee, so it would be useless to put students on the regular library committee.

Council members agreed that the present committee has too little power and drew up the proposal for a joint committee with full power of review.

Several members noted that the matter may have to go to President Flemming if any change is to be accomplished.

ASUO Vice-President Lee Bollinger said it might be the best step toward the community government idea.

Students to Assist In Fast for Freedom

Students throughout the country will participate in the Fifth Annual Thanksgiving Fast for Freedom on November 17.

Students will voluntarily give up their evening meal in a co-ordinated fast so that impoverished Negroes in the South may eat. The money thus saved will be contributed to a central fund which supports programs of food distribution and self-help co-operatives in the South.

Last year's fast involved an estimated 75,000 students and raised over \$26,000. This money was distributed to various projects through the Civil Rights desk of the U.S. National Student Association.

Major support was provided by this money for the Poor People's Co-operation, a group of 15 co-operatives run locally by Negroes in Mississippi. These co-ops provide work in sewing, quilting, woodworking and production of leather goods.

Last year's funds also supported a co-operative cement-block

factory, which is being built in Greene County, Alabama. Materials from this factory will be used in the building of low-cost housing.

The rest of the money from last year's fast went to support food distribution programs. Five student workers are now working in South Carolina, organizing such programs in counties where they do not already exist.

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tion is illustrated by the importance that both sides attach to the concept of "infrastructure" or its equivalent in Vietnamese, ha tang co so.

Broadly speaking, an infrastructure is any system of organized authority.

Implicit in the concept is the idea that an infrastructure—whether at the hamlet or national level—cannot exercise control over people without having their support in substantial degree.

Conversely, if control can be established, support may be developed over time through popular administration.

The personnel of their respective infrastructures are the primary weapons in the power struggle going on here at every level between the government and the Viet Cong.

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so to stay out of Viet Nam, but how many will join these service groups when there isn't a danger.

Goldrich answered with an example from a relatively peaceful but recent time, 1961-63. In these years, he said that "there were great increases in Peace Corps volunteers."

A question from the audience asked if the Peace Corps and other similar service projects should be considered equal to military service.

Boring replied that it was the draft which was discouraging participation in other programs, as a man who has just finished two years in the Peace Corps is reclassified I-A when he gets back.

It was also mentioned that the draft was responsible for the United States foreign policy, perpetuating the war in Viet Nam. No one on the panel condoned this foreign policy.

Henry Drummonds pointed out that in times of emergency conscription is necessary, as in the case of World War II.

Semas summed up this feeling by stating, "The way to stop Communism is not to kill all the communists, but to make it economically unfeasible for Communism to grow."

Major elements of each infrastructure are devoted to strengthening it and weakening the opposing infrastructure (e.g., both sides lay great stress on the development of strong recruiting and propaganda teams, both practice selective assassination to destroy key links in the enemy's infrastructure).

Furthermore, each infrastructure is said to be heavily infiltrated by agents of the opposing one. Significantly but not surprisingly, many Vietnamese believe that both Viet Cong and government village infrastructures are now much weaker than the traditional village power structure prior to the coming of colonialism or communism.

To gain its political—and cultural—ends, the elite infrastructure on each side has mobilized substantial portions of the population it controls. Each has developed weapons—technological, psychological, logistical—which are being tested wherever one side can find a weakness in the other.

At the present time, one side has technological and logistical superiority within the contested area, whereas the other appears to enjoy psychological advantage.

This is a struggle for power, and no holds are barred. The skill in highest demand is that of employing the appropriate weapon at the right time, whether it be a mortar or a lie.

Student Court Lacks Quorum

The Student Conduct Committee at its regular meeting Tuesday discussed the fact that the Student Court is having an administration problem in being unable to get a quorum of members to sit on a case. Some of the members have had to cut classes to make a quorum.

Phil Beale, acting Dean of Students, reported that there are a number of cases to come before the courts on cheating. Cases will be held Friday and Tuesday.

The committee discussed and will continue to discuss the possibility of changing the section on sanctions in the Student Code.

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
