

Recently Resigned**Peace Corpsman Gives Dissension**By CINDY GLASSOW

"The main problem was the lack of agreement of what role a Peace Corps volunteer should perform."

So said Kenny Lee, a Peace Corps worker who recently resigned, at "The Dissenting View" luncheon-discussion Wednesday.

Lee pointed out that his viewpoint was purely personal and that the project he worked in, the village health and sanitation project, was not typical of Peace Corps programs. It was an experimental project and represents only a small fragment of Peace Corps work, Lee said.

He described the language portion of the training program as good, but said the technical training was poorly conducted. "Much of the technical training was left up to us."

Lee was disappointed when he reached Thailand. "There were no definite sites designated for volunteers and the organization was very poor." Lee finally was sent to Udan, a large city in northwestern Thailand.

"I thought our role was health education in schools and actual sanitation projects — water systems, wells, sewage disposal systems. Instead we sat in an office for three months, with little actual contact with villagers and their problems."

Peace Corps Extends Drive

"We wish to thank all the professors whose classes we visited, as well as the Peace Corps Committee on campus, for helping make this drive a success," expressed Thern Kaldahl, on behalf of his team.

The Peace Corps team has been recruiting volunteers throughout the week.

Due to new developments, the drive has been extended until next Tuesday. Language Aptitude Tests are now scheduled at 10 a.m. and 2, 4, and 7 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday.

"Despite the weather, midterms, and the leaky tent," said Thern, "the turnout has really been good."

Over 200 students have signed up for testing during the week.

"The Language Aptitude Tests are not on a pass-or-fail basis," explained team member Gabby Winzork. "They test your ability to learn a foreign language and are used for placement."

Students are encouraged to sign up through Tuesday. By applying now, they can be notified in January of acceptance in a certain country and project.

"Don't feel an application obligates you to the Peace Corps," stated Thern. "It is the same as applying for any other job."

Those concerned with the draft should consult their local draft board for policies for deferment.

Volunteers can choose the country they wish to serve. The Peace Corps now aids 53 countries.

The particular country determines the volunteer's salary. The pay is based on the salaries of the people of the main social category. After completion of the two year assignment, volunteers receive \$1,500.

Another Peace Corps drive will be held at the University late in the spring.

held for the program in January, after the volunteers had been in Thailand for four months. The group decided that Village Health and Sanitation II, a group that was in training in the United States, shouldn't go to Thailand as the first group (Lee a member) had not laid sufficient foundations for a follow-up group.

This recommendation was sent to Washington, D.C., but was disregarded. Governmental officials said the training program had gone too far to waste the money and effort already spent. VHS II is now at work in Thailand.

Lee resigned in May. Nine others out of the group of 27 had already resigned or transferred to other projects. Lee said "If I had to do it over, I would have transferred, but I was too frustrated; I felt as though I'd accomplished nothing."

Flemming Urges Religion Courses

SALEM (AP) — University President Arthur S. Flemming, president of the Oregon Council of Churches, told the council Wednesday that the United States is plagued by "millions of religious illiterates."

Flemming announced his support for courses about religion to be taught at all levels of public education.

He said these courses are consistent with constitutional provisions for separation of church and state. At the same time he said he agreed with recent Supreme Court decisions on Bible reading and prayer in the schools.

At the council's annual meeting the Rev. Dwight Dodson, Portland, was elected to succeed Flemming as president.

The motion to accept the site plans for the new law building was tabled until Saturday by the Campus Planning Committee Thursday.

The proposed site for the classroom, office, library facilities, law and general purpose building is the northwest corner of the campus at 11th Avenue and Kincaid Street.

D. N. Unthank of the architectural firm of Wilmsen, Endicott, and Unthank of Eugene presented several concept studies of the area. He recommended:

- Initial development of the complex should be north of the Dady Hall axis.

- Major circulation and building access for the main campus area should be developed to the South of this axis.

- The complex development (building and landscape) should establish a west boundary to the campus.

- 11th Avenue should be studied for relocation in order to give the University the best use of that land between Franklin Boulevard and 11th Avenue.

The idea of building an addition to Fenton Hall instead of a new building for the law school was negated by Orlando J. Hollis, dean of the law school. He said that the format of the building was not functional for the enrollment needs of the next decade.

The planning office has recommended that Fenton Hall be renovated and opened to general classroom use.

Donlyn Lyndon, head of the architecture department, suggested that the Planning Committee look into relocating the new law building across Franklin Boulevard.

The committee has decided to review the usability of the land across Franklin before going any further on either the law building or the architecture and allied arts building.

The committee will meet Saturday morning to formulate recommendations to President Flemming on his proposals for University buildings to the State Board of Higher Education.

Board Meetings Set to Discuss Tuition, Housing

Two key issues of higher education policy in Oregon will be explored by committees of the State Board of Higher Education at meeting today in Portland.

The Committee on Finance and Business Affairs will discuss possible tuition raises in the state system, particularly for non-resident graduate students.

The ad hoc committee on student housing will also meet to discuss policies for running co-operative housing in the state system.

The housing committee will also discuss other types of student housing, including dormitories, married student housing, and privately-owned housing, such as fraternities, sororities, and dormitories.
