

University Debaters Win Important Meet

University students won places in nearly every event of the Western States Speech Tournament this past weekend as 62 colleges and universities competed for honors on Seattle's University of Washington campus.

University speakers also came home with a sweepstakes trophy in the junior division of the tourney, and one of the most important regional trials to be held this term.

Debaters Gary Roberts and Gregory Mowe had a record of five wins and one loss before their team was defeated in the quarter-finals of senior cross-examination by the University of Wyoming, which eventually won second place in the division.

University students won four places in extemporaneous speaking—Rebecca Nobles, first, and Susan Tungate, fifth, both in junior women's extemporaneous speaking; Stephen McLaughlin, third in senior men's; and Laura Griffith, fourth in senior women's division.

Two speakers from Oregon were among the winners in oratory—Mrs. Susan Miller, who won second place in senior women's oratory, and John Eads, third in junior men's competition.

Miss Tungate and Starla Banta won first and second places, respectively, in junior women's expository speaking.

In four of the past five years Oregon contestants have copped first-place honors in at least one division of the tourney, according to coach W. Scott Nobles, forensics coach. Last week's performances constituted a good, but not exceptional, Oregon finish.

Next speech competition for University students will be held this weekend at Colorado's Air Force Academy, which will sponsor the National Invitational Debate Tournament. The University's team, one of two representing the Pacific Northwest in the competition, will consist of Greg Mowe and Gary Roberts, both of whom have strong performance records this year.

Other team members will be competing at the University of Portland.

Reapportionment Subcommittee To Meet Today

The ASUO Senate Subcommittee on Reapportionment will hold its final meeting of 1966 in the Student Union at 3 p.m. Tuesday.

According to subcommittee chairman Jerry Norton, this will probably be the last chance for interested students to present proposals for reapportionment of the Senate. Future meetings will be concerned with selecting and putting in final shape a plan to present to the senate.

Senator-at-large Gary Feuerberg is expected to make a new recommendation to the subcommittee at this meeting. Thus far, the subcommittee has heard plans for an increase in Senate membership to make it more representative of population, change to a parliamentary system, a two legislative house structure, and for random selection of senators.

vague notion that a water main would be put in since last summer," Block commented. "Why didn't they give us any warning then, before the construction started?" Instead, residents have come home to see their shrubs and flowers uprooted and

a trench dug across their yards.

Most of the yards in the project have already been dug up, and only three stand in the way of completing the construction. Block's next door neighbor, Timothy Fossum, noted that the wooden deck he spent several hours building last summer will be coming out. The major complaint, other than lack of preparation for the construction, is that the yards are not being restored to their original conditions.

Block maintains that he will not let the workers touch his property until the demands of the tenants are settled and the yards previously torn up are restored.

University Gets Science Grants

Two grants of over \$100,000 each have been awarded to the University to train high school teachers to teach advanced placement courses in mathematics and biology.

Both grants are from the National Science Foundation. One for \$118,200 will go to the Department of Mathematics. The other, for \$104,100, will go to the Department of Biology.

Both departments will conduct full year programs to prepare teachers to teach college-level courses.

Applicants must have three years experience teaching in high school. Deadline is January 20, 1967.

Each participant will receive a \$3,000 stipend for the academic year, and a \$450 dependency allowance per dependent.

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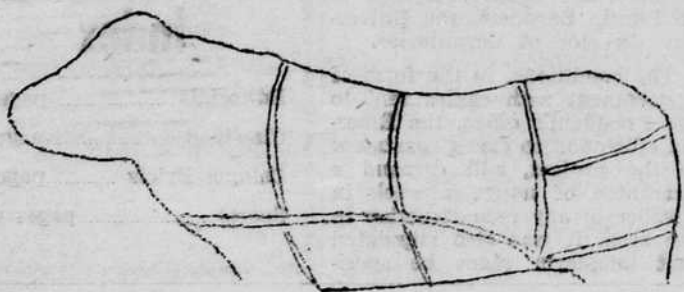
