

UO Booters Split Against Canadians

Oregon's soccer team split two games in Canada over the weekend, downing University of Victoria 4-1 and losing to University of British Columbia 3-1. Both games were tied well into the second half before the deciding goals were scored.

At Victoria Saturday, the Ducks and Vikings played 60 minutes scoreless before Oregon broke the ice. The Ducks scored on an indirect free kick in the Victoria penalty area, with Paul Wodmleighton passing to John Morgan, who passed to John Cocking for the goal.

Victoria quickly tied the score, but Wormleighton put the visitors ahead for good with a boot from 25 yards out. Morgan tallied the final two goals, kicking one and heading a pass from Andrew Nkongho for the other.

Webfoot coach Jan Broekhoff praised goalie Walter Kopczuk for a "terrific job" against the Vikings, and had equal honors for Vernon Crew's goaltending against UBC.

Sunday's match against the

Thunderbirds was played in a strong wind and hard rain. Duck captain Tim Saben chose to play with the wind in the first half, but UBC opened the scoring after 15 minutes. The Ducks rallied, with Morgan tying the score five minutes later as he headed the ball from the UBC goalie's outstretched hands.

Both Canadian teams played a much harder, faster game than is played by Oregon colleges, and the Ducks' condition showed in the second half. The Thunderbirds broke the 1-1 tie 20 minutes into the period, as Crew had trouble getting rid of the muddy ball. Crew's clearing kick was short, and a UBC forward placed the ball in the Oregon nets before the goalie could get into position.

The final Thunderbird tally came at the 42-minute mark.

Broekhoff complimented the Duck defense which worked most of the second half against UBC. He noted that the 3-1 loss to a strong team is more significant than the 4-1 win against a weaker opponent.

Japan Study Grants Offered

Qualified applicants have been urged to apply before December 15 for three overseas field research projects which will be conducted in Japan next summer by University faculty members.

These projects will be located in Tokyo and Kanazawa, and are part of the overseas research program carried on by the Center for Japanese Studies.

Funds for the projects come from the Ford Foundation. Grantees will receive round-trip transportation to Japan, a living allowance, and research expenses while overseas. Selected applicants will also be enrolled in the University tuition free and receive academic credit for participation in the projects.

Requirements for student participation in the program include holding United States citizenship at the time of departure and enrollment in an institution within the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

Application forms are available from the Center for Japanese Studies, Room 175, Prince Lucien Campbell Hall. Deadline is December 15.

Conducting the new program of student-faculty interdisciplinary research training will be Alfred Bloom, associate professor of religious studies; Ralph Falconeri, lecturer in history; and Richard Smith, assistant professor of Architecture.
