

"Dirty Sheets" Prompt No Action

Was there any official reaction to complaints about a Homecoming sign that read "OSU — Our Pants Are Off to You" that decorated one sorority?

There'll be no official disciplinary action taken. But there were some phone calls by Administration officials asking living units to "re-evaluate" their signs, according to Bob Bowlin, dean of men. "I thought some of them were in poor taste, possibly belonging at other schools," he added.

The offending sign, which appeared on the Emerald front page along with several others, were dubbed "dirty sheets."

Bowlin said there probably wouldn't be any action in Student Court.

There aren't any rules to cover it, "and I'd hate to see any more rules. But we could use a little more student responsibility in such cases," he said.

Integration Failure Seen by Indian

An Indian graduate student charged that the University is failing to integrate foreign students into the life of the University at a World Affairs Briefing session last Tuesday.

Manmohan Jawa found echoes of agreement and some dissent from other foreign students.

Jawa said the University failed on three counts:

- Its student body is dominated by fraternities and sororities which he called "agents of social segregation."

- Its curriculum is descended mainly from Britain ("there's nothing universal about its curriculum").

- Faculty and administration are mostly white.

He said some American difficulties in foreign policy problems can be traced to the lack of contact with other cultures that results.

Another Indian student disagreed with Jawa. "Segregation is not a common practice." He said that foreign students could not be shy if they wanted friendships with Americans. "Since we have come half way around the world, we should be ready to go a little bit farther now that we're here."

But he agreed that he has experienced segregation on the part of fraternities, "but never in so many words."

An American student agreed that Greek houses are an obstacle to full integration of foreign students into University life. "Until we wipe out the fraternity system, we can't go much further."

Several students said that living in a dormitory, at least for a term, can help in making friends.

Costs for entertainment are anywhere from five to 20 times as much in America as in many foreign students' homelands, several said. One Dutch student said

that at home foreign students were given discounts or free admission to events at his university. "The University Theatre is really good, but it's too expensive for us."

Jawa drew some reaction from foreign student adviser Kenneth Ghent with a charge that foreign or black instructors are discriminated against by the University in hiring.

Ghent said that was absolutely false.

He said, "We'll never totally achieve integration." But he said the University is trying "not to be provincial." If Oregon students seem backward, he said, it's because many are from small towns. He urged foreign students to be the venturesome ones in making friends with American students.
