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constantly frustrated by American and Russian power on her very borders.

Similarly, despite the development of Chinese technology, the gulf between her living standards and ours grows greater each year. She is constantly reminded that, as the most powerful of the underdeveloped nations, China is also one of the poorest.

Her struggle against the U.S. is at bottom an economic one—a struggle of have-nots against haves, of the exploited against the exploiters.

The larger conflict between China and the U.S. shapes up along several lines:

Most of the bourgeois nations led by the U.S.

share a history strongly influenced by capitalism and colonialism.

To most of the potential members of the revolutionary camp, capitalism and colonialism are anathema.

Significantly, it was Lenin who drew out the relationship between capitalism and colonialism in his treatise on "Imperialism: The Dying Stage of Capitalism." His analysis and his alternative, socialism, have profoundly influenced many intellectuals in former colonial areas, whether they are communist or anti-communist.

This helps to explain both why Americans see red when they hear socialism and why, conversely, socialism has such an appeal in countries from Burma to Indonesia, including Viet Nam.

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a university;

• That the court lacks jurisdiction and is without power to grant relief requested (that is, even if Miss Dieffenderfer were innocent of cheating, the court has no power to give her the specific grade of "B" which she is requesting);

• That the complaint does not present a justifiable controversy (a legal point closely related to points (1) and (3));

• and that the action was premature.

The last point, Holloway said, is especially important because of the possibility that Miss Dieffenderfer's case may yet be returned to the University Disciplinary Committee (UDC) for a full trial.

When he stated his decision, Judge Buck cited two other claims involving university procedure. In both cases, the court ruled that grading was under its jurisdiction.

Miss Dieffenderfer told the Colorado Daily that she was not yet sure of what action, if any, she and her attorney will take.

She mentioned that among these possibilities are dropping the issue, appealing it to the Colorado Supreme Court, and amending the motion now in front of Judge Buck.

Dubin to Discuss Work, Automation

Robert Dubin, a specialist on the sociology of work, will discuss "Work, Automation, and the Affluent Society" at 7:30 p.m. today in a Browning Room lecture.

Dubin is a research professor of sociology at the University who has concentrated much of his research on various aspects of work.

He has written "The World of Work," "Working Union Management," "Social Science Approach to Business Behavior," and "Leadership and Productivity."

As a Guggenheim Fellow and Fulbright Research Fellow in Germany in 1963-64, Dubin conducted research studies of German industry and employment relations.

Hefner Explains 'New Morality'

Hugh Hefner will discuss his philosophy and show a reporter through his Playboy Empire on Regional Report at 9 p.m. today on cable channel 7.

Hefner's observations will be a part of a program devoted to the new morality. Also scheduled are interviews in the Haight Asbury sector of San Francisco which will look at non-involvement, psychedelics and sex; a report from New York on censorship; and a report from Athens, Georgia, on the conflicts in the South between the new morality and "old-time religion."

Other aspects of the new morality, ranging from urbanism to modern music, will also be discussed.

For anyone interested, the Co-operative Christian Ministry will provide coffee and a cable-connected set at 736 E. 16th for viewing. Discussion of the program will follow.

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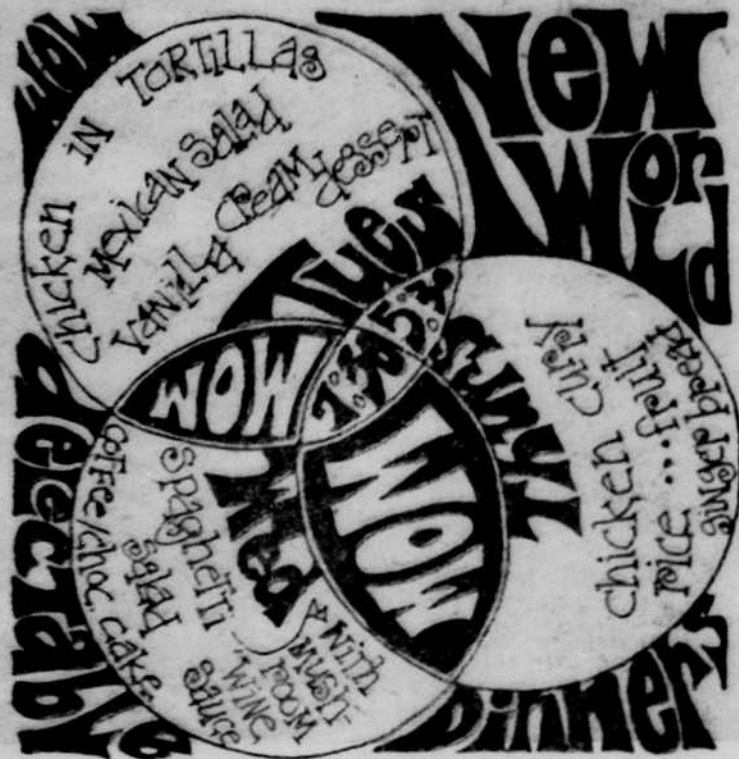
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
