the next five projects which are financed only out of bonds.

He has also included two projects at the University Medical School in Portland which were included in the Board of Higher Education's 1969-71 program because federal funds may be available for them under a federal grant to build a teaching hospital addition there.

University projects on Hatfield's list include a third addition to the Science Building, an addition to Gerlinger Hall, the addition to the School of Architecture and Allied Arts, and the proposed co-operative living dormitories.

The concert is open to the public free of charge.

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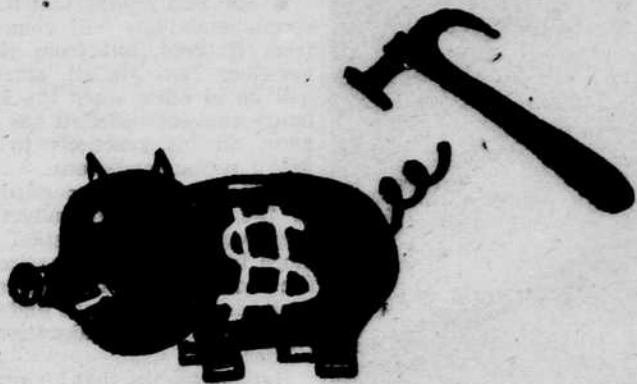
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
