

UCLA Literary Magazine Suspended

LOS ANGELES (CPS) — The weekly literary supplement of UCLA's Daily Bruin, the student newspaper, was suspended from publication following pressure from local officials. They protested the reproduction of a picture of a nude woman and an accompanying article which ran in the January 18 issue of the paper.

The picture, appearing in the supplement INTRO, drew criticism from several Los Angeles County supervisors, local newspapers and two UCLA students, who say they will sue for discontinuance of the Daily Bruin.

The picture, drawn by the German artist George Grosz, drew

violent reaction from the German government in 1923 when it was first exhibited. The government imposed a fine on Grosz and ordered that the exhibitions be dismantled.

The decision to suspend INTRO was passed unanimously in an emergency meeting of the Student Communications Board, which called for a policy study committee to set up guidelines to insure the independence of student publications. The board announced that it found nothing wrong with the article but suspended publication partly because of recent political pressure by conservatives to investigate the

university.

The policy study—chaired by Digby Diehl, editor of INTRO, will hold open hearings to consider what material can be considered acceptable for INTRO with respect to the readership of the Daily Bruin.

Diehl said that his committee, rather than imposing censorship, will set up specific recommendations to "establish a liberal precedent" for student publications.

Editor Neil Reichline of the Daily Bruin said that the board's action was taken because "the Communications Board was pressured by the situation of the university today. Keeping this in mind," he added, "I suppose their decision was a wise one."

"The board, I'm sure," Reichline said, "continues to think INTRO is a literary magazine of superior quality."

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors became involved in the INTRO controversy when it decided to refer the INTRO article to the County Anti-Obsecenity Commission and to send copies of that edition to the president of the Board of Regents and to the governor's office.

One member of the Board of Supervisors, Warren Dorn, expressed his disapproval of the article and compared it to an exhibit at the Los Angeles County Art Museum last year. Dorn had

vehemently denounced the exhibit, a presentation of modern art sculpture by Edward Kienholz which included sculptures of old cars and of couples petting. As a result of Dorn's objections, the exhibit was a great success and attracted thousands of viewers, according to the Daily Bruin.

Following his dismissal, Clark Kerr issued a statement saying that one of the major achievements was the assurance of student freedom of expression, especially for student publications.

Governor Reagan, after seeing a copy of Intro, was reported on a television news program as being "inarticulate with rage." Reagan said that "anybody who would print anything like this (Grosz's picture) is sick."

INTRO editor Diehl said that he plans to fight for the rights of students to speak and act free-

ly. "Our voices have not been silenced by cowardice," he said.

The two students, Alan Bock and Jeraldine Anderson, said that objectionable material in the Daily Bruin "has a tendency to generate in the minds of the general public a belief that students at UCLA are lewd and dissolute."

Meanwhile, the Los Angeles County Attorney's office, which has reviewed the case, has reported that there is probably no legal action that can be taken against the student newspaper, in light of recent freedom of the press decisions.

Pose Results In Action Against College Coed

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP)—A curvy 18-year-old University of Florida coed posed in the buff for an off-campus humor magazine and was charged with indiscretion.

Now students have rallied to her side, amid a campus furor over her treatment.

Today she faced a hearing before the faculty disciplinary committee.

Pamela Brewer, 38-25-38, got her parents' permission to pose on a white Persian rug and the picture came out in a full-length gatefold in the magazine Charlatan.

The coed, from Springfield, Virginia, is the center of a rising controversy over student rights and university control.

"The whole idea of students' relationship to the university has become increasingly sharp in the past few years — the whole idea of individual rights and a rule of law," said Stan Laughlin, an associate professor of law.

An editorial in the magazine said it would challenge any

charges made against the sophomore.

Laughlin said it was not a suggestive picture and that the girl "was covered in all the appropriate spots."

"Our position is that the university has no authority to govern her activities so long as they are lawful, particularly when they occur off campus," said her attorney, Selig Goldin.
