

Ersted Awards Honor Teaching

Two Ersted Award of \$1,000 each will be given this year for distinguished and inspired teaching by University faculty members.

The Ersted Award Committee, is now seeking nominations from students, faculty and alumni.

Donald DuShane, dean of students, has announced that accumulated interest has made possible the presentation of two Ersted Awards in 1967.

This was also made possible in 1965 and 1966, but in prior years a single award had been made each year since the awards were established in 1957.

Nominating forms are available from dormitory counselors, living organizations, or the Office of Student Affairs. Nominations should be submitted to Dean DuShane, Emerald Hall, or deposited in a special ballot box on the terrace of the Student Union during the week of April 24-28.

The Awards are made available through a trust fund from the late A. J. Ersted of Atherton, California, and is administered by the University Development Fund.

The recipients of the two \$1,000 awards this year will be announced at the June Commencement exercises. The application deadline is May 1.

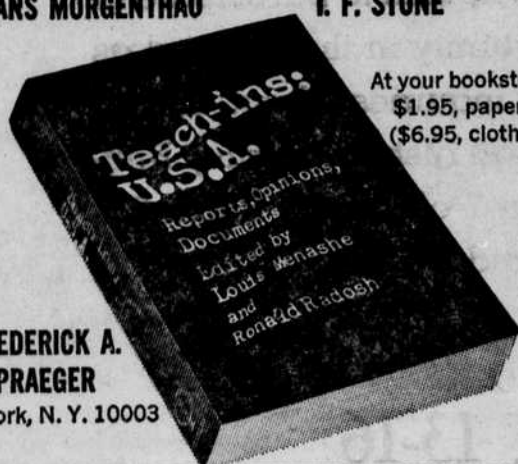
