

## Library Offers Low-Cost Texts

How often has a question come up in your family that could be answered if the proper reference book were at hand?

The University's School of Librarianship, aware of the need

for low cost reference books in the home, has compiled a list of 35 books covering a variety of topics from everyday etiquette to a legal handbook.

The reference books are all

paperbacks from the 1967 listings and can be purchased at book stores or from paperback vendors. Total cost for the entire 35 books, at listed prices, is \$35.

A purchaser would be able to choose the particular books to fill his needs for less money. Probably only a family with children would want the Family Medical Encyclopedia at 75 cents, whereas the Consumer's Guide to Better Buying (50 cents) would be handy in most homes.

The list illustrates the wide range of good reference materials available at low cost in paperback form.

Graduate students in Advanced Bibliography and Reference in the University's School of Librarianship prepared the list this summer under the direction of Robert Carter, visiting instructor from Pasadena City College.

## Canadian Cops History Award

A study of machine politics over 100 years ago has won the University's Marion F. McClain Prize Award in Pacific Northwest History for James Hendrickson, associate professor of history at the University of Victoria in Victoria, B.C.

The prize is given by the University in recognition of the best manuscript in the field of Pacific Northwest history submitted by a

candidate for an advanced degree at the University.

Hendrickson won the \$500 award for his doctoral dissertation "Joe Lane of Oregon: Machine Politics and the Sectional Crisis, 1849-1861." It is the story of the first governor of the Oregon Territory and a chronicle of American political history in the chaotic 1850's.

the building rest with the Student Union Board.

The SU Board is comprised of 17 members and headed by Tom Nash. Last February, under recommendation by President Arthur S. Flemming, the SU Board was incorporated into the ASUO, making its decisions subject to the ASUO Senate.

Under the SU Board are ten committees which carry out their own programs—recorded classics, jazz, arts, forum, movies, dance, talent, personnel, and publicity.

There is also a recreation council which co-ordinates all non-NCAA sports such as rugby, soc-

cer, bowling, judo, the rifle team, the ski team, the hiking and bicycling clubs, and the outing club.

Reynolds has plans to add to the SU's facilities if the space and money becomes available. He listed five additions to facilities he would like to see made.

- An arts and crafts center which would provide work space and equipment for everything from woodwork to sculpturing.

- A periodical room that would provide material not contained in the Browsing Room.

- A service area and travel agency office.

- A hall for public lectures.
