

Publications Board Tackles Long Agenda

The Student Publications Board initiated an investigation of student drivers in state cars and approved an Emerald request for funds Thursday.

In its first meeting of the 1967-68 year, the Board went through the first meeting formalities of introductions and explanations of function and then tackled the first items of a long agenda.

A move that Publications Board executive secretary Dick Reynolds investigate the situation which had arisen due to accidents involving students driving state cars was passed unanimously.

Board member George Platt, associate professor of law, reviewed reports of two such accidents involving Emerald student drivers.

He said indications were that use of state cars by students was being questioned by officials in Salem and by the University motor pool.

Emerald editor, Mike Fancher,

complained that since the two accidents, the motor pool has issued unsafe cars to Emerald staff members.

Fancher pointed out that a safety record can't be improved if unsafe cars are issued.

The Emerald's request for funds was for a student operated wire service machine, the Western Union Telex machine over which Collegiate Press Service copy could be received and sent.

The Emerald will request to President Flemming that the funds be taken from the University general reserve.

In an effort to facilitate the handling of business, the Board voted to meet twice a month, rather than the once a month meetings as last year.

The Board voted to meet from 7 to 8:30 a.m. every other Thursday for the next two months.

The next publications board meeting will be Thursday at 7 a.m. in the EMU.

SDS Schedules Poster Party

A Students for a Democratic Society poster party for a rally and a week long picket of the Selective Service office will be held October 14 at 10 a.m. The place is 17th and Patterson.

At its meeting Wednesday night, SDS produced some changes in its format. It was decided the group's next meeting would feature the election of: a projects steering committee, a working chairman, a treasurer, and a recording secretary.

Almost all future projects will be handled on a project-cell basis.

This means that an SDS member will be co-ordinating reports back to the remaining body, and handling the financing of the project.

Another idea decided upon at the meeting was the obtaining of an SDS office on campus. By this they hope to increase communication between members and to handle correspondence.

One current project involves support of the Delano Grape strike. Giumarra Vineyards Corp. in Delano, California is the target of the SDS boycott.

Volunteers will question Eu-

gene market owners about the sale of Giumarra's grapes. If they insist on selling them, a picket of their store will be organized.

Other projects include: the preparation and sale of Christmas Cards to be sent to soldiers in Viet Nam, a boycott of Dow Chemical products (napalm manufacturers) in Eugene, and collection of funds to send a University representative to the October 21 Confrontation of the War-makers in a Washington, D.C. rally.

A table to distribute SDS literature will be set up every week day on the Student Union terrace. It will be used as a second co-ordination center.



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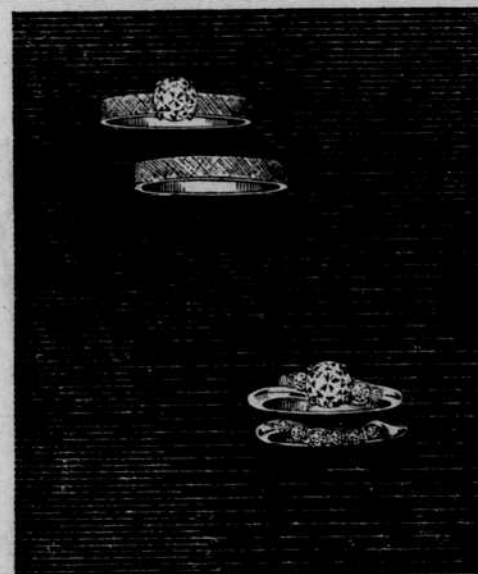
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Hearing Slated On Closing Hours

The Student Conduct Committee has announced a public hearing to discuss the adoption of an amendment to the Student Conduct Code relating to closing hour regulations.

The amendment, submitted by committee member Bud Titus, would, in effect, abolish mandatory closing hours in University related housing.

Titus introduced the amendment to the code at the Wednesday night meeting.

Basically the provisions of the Titus amendment are as follows:

- The University will establish no closing hour rules for any student living in a fraternity, sorority, or co-operative. However, this does not prohibit such groups from establishing their own closing hours as "housekeeping" rules.

- Two kinds of student dormitories shall be established. "Open dorms" will be those with no closing hours. "Restricted dorms" will be those for which closing hours will be established.

- Any dorm resident shall be eligible to live in either an open or restricted dorm.

- A dorm resident will be assigned to an open dormitory unless either the student or the student's parents file a request that the student be placed in a restricted dormitory unit.

- If the student or parent does file such a request the student shall be placed in a restricted dormitory if it is available.

- Closing hours for students in restricted dorms will be 12 midnight Sunday through Thursday and 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights.

The Office of the Associate Dean of Students asks that all interested persons and groups attend the hearing.

The hearing will be held in the EMU Monday at 9 p.m. The room will be posted Monday in the EMU.

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
