Group Limited To Investigation

The fate of the newly formed ASUO Housing Discrimination Committee has been decided.

The group's function will be limited to that of a purely investigative body. In a memorandum to the Student Conduct Committee, ASUO President Scott Farleigh said, "I have conferred with the Discrimination Committee and it is our opinion that the original request for the ASUO Committee to act as both an investigative body and a court is not consistent with due process of the court system."

Farleigh described the future function of the Committee as one of "compiling reports, making recommendations, or offering assistance to concerned groups or persons."

Professor Scott Nobles, acting chairman, reminded members of the Student Conduct Committee that, "This does not necessarily close the matter of including discrimination as a group offense under the Code."

The question of whether or not discrimination becomes a group offense will be decided at the next faculty meeting. If it does become a group offense it will be under the jurisdiction of the Student Conduct Committee. Nobles commented that the Conduct Committee is already overburdened and could not handle the large amount of cases which are likely to arise.

It was the general consensus of the Conduct Committee that if the faculty does vote to include discrimination as a group offense, the Committee will be compelled to create a minor tribunal specifically equipped to handle such cases.

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Program Series Discusses Myths, Realities on Drugs

Drugs: Myths and Realities is a program dealing with drugs including alcohol that will consist of six public lectures with panel discussions and informal meetings led by experts. The series is an educational effort on the part of the ASUO through its Speakers and Debate Bureau and the Office of Student Affairs.

The program is designed to give academic as well as civic communities an objective overview of one of the most significant social issues of our day. All sessions are free and open to the public and all interested persons are invited to attend informal meetings with participants following the lectures.

Monday, October 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the EMU, Joel Fort will present "Drugs and the Student." Fort is from the department of sociology, University of California, Berkeley, and was formerly

director for Special Problems, San Francisco Health Department and formerly consultant on Drug Abuse, United Nations and World Health Organization. He will deal with the world of drugs and today's youth.

The second lecture to be held November 27 will deal with the social, medical, and legal aspects of marijuana. Paul Blachly, Ph.D., University of Oregon Medical School, Professor of Psychiatry; Arthur Pearl, Ph.D., Profes-

sor of Education, University of Oregon; and Sidney Lezak, U.S. Attorney, District of Oregon, will compose the panel discussing the drug most discussed on college campuses.

Other topics will be psychedelic drugs, barbiturates and narcotics, alcohol and the President's Crime Report as it relates to drugs and alcohol.

Various University living organizations will host the speakers at informal luncheons and coffee hours.

State Department Schedules Exam

The U.S. Information Agency-State Department Foreign Service Examination will be given on Dec. 2.

Deadline for filing is Oct. 21. Applicants must be under age 31 on December 2, 1967, and have completed junior year of college, and a U.S. citizen for at least seven and one half years on Dec. 2, 1967.

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
