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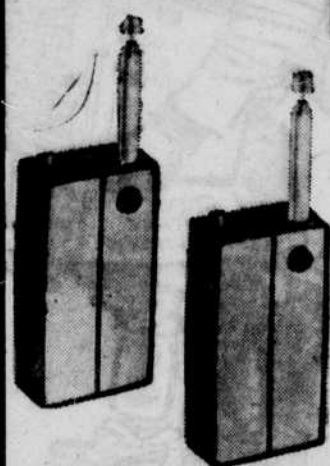

sent grew out of a question of who was to take the notes.

According to Edwards, Sorenson said that they could meet the following Monday and he would try to get someone other than a teaching assistant to take the notes.

Sorenson would not allow his teaching assistants to take the notes because it would interfere with their job and would give them official connection with the class.

But Edwards secured notetakers, proceeded with the project, and did not meet again with Sorenson.

"I didn't assume this was going to go forward without me knowing who was doing it," Sorenson said.

Sorenson said the reason for his change of position was a September 28 History department resolution opposing the notes.

"I realized there was more than a personal reaction involved," he said.

"I gave no suggestion of being in favor of it (the note taking). I am not in favor of it, and don't really think it's a teaching aid."

Sorenson explained that before the department ruling he had no reason to say no.

"I now feel I have a strong reason in that it is against department policy," he said.

Both Farleigh and Edwards confirmed that Sorenson's decision would be honored.

"I stressed the fact that it was completely on an experimental basis. I told him if at any time he wanted to stop the notes he should notify us," Edwards said.
