Reagan Urges Viet Nam Victory

The U.S. must keep on fighting until the "security of our allies has been assured in freedom and independence," said California Governor Ronald Reagan in Albany Saturday.

Reagan claimed that the decision not to stand in Laos opened the corridors to South Viet Nam for the Communists, and since then, the U.S. has been "too late with too little" while tipping its hand to the enemy.

However, Reagan said the Americans should make up their minds as to whether they want to carry the war through to a conclusion or give up.

Americans cannot turn their backs from an aggression which seeks to crush free and independent nations in Asia, he said.

U.S. colleges and universities with about half of the nation's college enrollment. About 1,000 college administrators are to attend the four days of meetings.

Jensen said his group would resist "as emphatically as we can, the escalation of tuition and fees." He indicated the cost of education would keep up with the value of dollars and the cost of living, but expressed a hope it would not rise much above its present place in the economy.

He said he sees the biggest problem facing higher education as one of providing the best possible education to the increasing number of students within the framework of financing, staff and facilities.

Cornette said any indication of student power on his campus is more student participation than power. He pointed to a new student activities building on the campus and said students had a hand in planning for it and in voting to increase fees to make it possible.

"For the most part, said Jensen, "this student power stems from idealistic interest of students toward their own involvement and what their lives hold for them."

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Should Shoplifting at the Co-Op Come Under the Conduct Code?

- Shoplifting increases the Co-op's costs.
- Shoplifting may be a planned theft or an indiscretion of the moment.
- Shoplifting is a crime punishable under the state law. The penalty can be up to one year in the county jail or up to eight years in the state penitentiary. Arrest and conviction can seriously handicap a student's future life and even close the door to certain occupations.

The Co-op board feels that prosecution under the Conduct Code would be a more effective means of handling student shoplifters. The code provides for a variety of penalties, many of which will not become a part of the permanent student records. The code, while stressing that students have responsibilities, recognizes that a mistake made when young can have life-long consequences.

Since the Co-op is owned exclusively by persons affiliated with the university and since about 95 per cent of the customers are university students, the Co-op board feels that the Conduct Code's jurisdiction should be expanded to include the Co-op. The code can be made more effective by including more of the student's lives.
