personal opinion that the unanimous vote rule should be allowed only after a fraternity or sorority is, in fact, integrated with members from the minority groups.

Olsen said Flemming's fears that fraternities and sororities do or will practice racial or religious discrimination are unjustified. He added that regulations against such practices are unenforceable because it is a private and individual act.

In an interview with Flemming after the meeting he disclosed a specific incident in which the majority of the members of a University fraternity tried to pledge a Negro last year and failed.

Flemming said the fraternity, which he declined to name, was unable to pledge the man because its national organization would not let it amend its local voting laws, which require a unanimous vote to pledge a member.

A Committee for Fraternity Affairs representative, Thomas Chapman of Eugene, denied knowledge of such an incident, saying that if the group had known of it it would have con-

ducted an immediate investigation.

Flemming refused to comment when Chapman challenged him to produce details of the incident so the alumni group could look into the matter.

not to support a public hearing. The EEA board feels that Kunkle should have appealed through existing professional channels for an ethics investigation, and that clarification cannot be achieved through an open hearing.

Kunkle, who has been teaching 13 years, worked eight years in Salem before coming to Eugene.

"At issue," said Porter after Kunkle's December 18 dismissal, "is controversy and the teacher's position in relation to controversy."

Institute to Hold Research Studies

Under the sponsorship of the Institute of International Studies and Overseas Administration, two summer research studies will be held in Israel during summer 1963.

These studies of approximately two months duration, are intended to provide opportunities for field research in developing countries. Advanced graduate students in the behavioral sciences are eligible to apply for membership on the study teams.

The first group, under the direction of Lester Seligman of the department of political science, will be analyzing political recruitment and mobility.

The second project will be under Robert Dubin professor of sociology, and will be concerned with organizational behavior.

Any interested graduate student should execute the regular University assistantship application and submit it with a statement of professional interest to Seligman or Dubin. Preference will be given to students who have a professional interest in Near East area studies, who are single or who would not be accompanied by families on the field work.

Further information and appointment provisos may be obtained from either Seligman or Dubin.
