

Fantastic Frosh Outrun Claudia's

Take a group of former college basketball stars from the Pacific Northwest. Put them on the same AAU team, Claudia's of Portland. Let them have a 6-10 center and three excellent outside shooters.

Then set them face to face against the fantastic Oregon Frosh.

Spot Claudia's an 18-10 lead in the first 6½ minutes of the game. Let them finish with 105 points, including a shooting percentage of .467 from the field and .840 from the foul line.

What happens:

Believe it or not, the Frosh score 119 and win going away.

With 6-9 center Stan Love scoring 34 points, 6-5 forward Bill Drozdiak 26, 6-5 guard Leonard Jackson 24, and 5-9 guard Carlton Stater 19, the Frosh rebounded from an early deficit and never trailed after 4:12 of the first half.

Claudia's challenging line-up boasted ex-Oregon State center Karl Anderson, Randy Stoll from Washington State, Gonzaga's Bob Hunt and Don Hakala of Linfield, plus Oregon grads Dave Kafoury, Bill Jennings and Bob Foskett.

Hakala High Man

Hakala was high with 28 Hunt scoring 27. Stoll pushed in 15, and Kafoury and Jennings 10 each.

Oregon spent most of its time at the free throw line, as the seven Claudia's players totaled 29 fouls, plus six technicals. Four Claudia's players fouled out of the game. It got so bad that the last two fouling out, Jennings and Kafoury, had to stay in the game to give Claudia's a full team.

The Ducklings connected on 37 of 51 attempts from the line, led by Drozdiak's 16 for 20. It was Drozdiak's two free throws that tied the game at 21-21 for the Frosh after trailing in the early going. Claudia's led last

at 40-39 with 4:29 to go in the first half, but lay-ins by John Green and Mike Williams put the Frosh in front to stay.

The second half, like the first, was a run-and-shoot affair. The biggest Frosh lead was 17 points, 93-76, at 9:56, but by 3:58 that lead was down to six at 105-99. Oregon pulled away from that point on, with Love scoring 11 of his 34 points in the last 3:14 of the game.

Love's performance, as well as those of Drozdiak and Jackson, was his best of the season. His scoring average is now 25.0; his 17 rebounds moved his team-leading average to 12.4. Drozdiak, the second leading scorer, carries an 18.0 average.

Ducklings Top L & C

An evening earlier, despite a sloppy defensive effort, the Ducklings handed the mediocre Lewis and Clark JVs a 96-70 loss.

Shooting was the big difference in the game, as Oregon connected on 44 of 92 attempts for 478 while Lewis and Clark hit only 25 of 87 for .287.

Love was the leading scorer with 26 points, all from the field, but he missed a number of opportunities from close in. Drozdiak scored 22, hitting 11 of 15, most from the 20 to 25-foot range.

Improve Record to 3-1

Wrestlers Capture Pair

In previous matches, Oregon defeated the Multnomah Athletic Club and lost a 21-17 squeaker to defending NCAA College Division champion Portland State.

In the 25-6 victory over WW-SC, the Webfoots relied on pins by Kip Gorton at 160 and Eddy Dunn, 177, while George McNair at 167 posted the lone fall in the 25-9 victory over SOC.

Masashi Saito, 130, and McNair were individual standouts of the mat action, each winning twice.

This week the wrestlers will prepare for dual meets against the University of California and Stanford, Friday at McArthur Court. Mat time against California is slated for 4 p.m. with Stanford scheduled for 7 p.m.
