

Foundation Grants Open to Students

Undergraduate students will conduct research in biology over the summer term under the impetus of a \$26,200 grant awarded by the National Science Foundation to the University.

According to George Carroll, assistant professor of biology and project director, the undergraduate participant research grant will provide 20 stipends of \$60 per week which will be awarded to promising undergraduates indicating an interest in research. The grant will also provide materials and equipment.

The recipients of the stipends will be chosen from throughout the country, although primarily from states west of the Mississippi, Carroll said.

Up to eight stipends may be awarded to University students and special preference will be given to small schools in the Pacific Northwest and Great Basin areas.

Students will be spending from nine to 11 weeks conducting research projects, for which they will earn up to eight hours of credit.

College seniors will not be considered for the awards except under special circumstances since the primary interest of the program is to attract under-

graduate students into doing research while they are still in their undergraduate years, said Carroll.

Applicants should send transcripts, three letters of recommendation, and a letter telling of background and previous participation in science projects to:

The deadline for applications is March 15, and recipients will be notified by April 15.

Plan Early—Now For Your Funds

Its new location is in the center of the science complex, below ground floor level with an entrance in the new glass-walled lobby beneath the building. The division's hours will be the same as the General Library's.
